(Continued From Page 1) to live. More persons are encouraged to attend college and they graduate with enlarged desires—meaning more business for the business people.

Privately-financed educational institutions are facing a financial crisis, Mr. Schweibert said. The

costs of operation have risen 60 per cent since 1941 and income from endowments have decreased eight per cent.

"We can't go too far in increasing tuition", the speaker said. "We believe that when the business people realize the situation they will take care of the matter. It is important that we preserve both private and public schools".

Mr. Schweibert closed his talk with an explanation of the various types of contributions to the college.

Kay Johnson of Boise reported for the committee that has been working for a proposed federal fish hatchery at Cascade and tendered his resignation as chairman. The group voted to retain the committee and increase it by two members.

R. G. Larson of Nyssa, president of the associated chambers, who presided at the meeting introduced Dyre Bennett, mayor of Ontario, who delivered the address of welcome.
