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Nyssa Loses 2 Tilts To Tigers

The Nyssa Bulldogs fell before a thumping La Grande high school basketball aggregation in two games on the Nyssa floor over the week-end. Nyssa lost Friday night 53 to 32 and Saturday night 49 to 20.

Although not expected to defeat the boys from the bigger city, the Bulldogs made a poorer showing against the visitors than was anticipated.

During the first half of the Friday game, the Bulldogs held the Tigers on fairly even terms, but their defense failed in the third period and the visitors spurred ahead to more than double their first half score by the end of the contest.

Gilbert and MacAllister of La Grande and Williams of Nyssa tied for high point honors, each scoring 12.

With both teams playing their first games of the season the contests were rough and ragged.

With one victory already registered, the Tigers showed more power and efficiency Saturday night, although their score was not as great as Friday night, they won by a greater margin. The half-time score was 26 to 3.

MacAllister led his team-mates with 17 points. Koyano was high for Nyssa with 5.

Nyssa players in the games were Hunter, Williams, Alvin Pecka, Wilder and Koyano. Substitutes were Chadwick, Lowe and Albert Pecka.

The Nyssa B squad defeated Huntington 34 to 30 in a preliminary game Saturday night. Two Huntington players fouled out in the fourth period.

The Bulldogs will play Parma there December 10 and will meet Baker here December 11.

WENDT SAYS USSR HAS ATOMIC SECRET

This fuel does not require any air. Such an engine is ideal for submarine. If it is to replace coal or oil it must be made cheaper than it is now. That will come, but I don't know when; maybe in the next 10 years.

The rays from the atomic bomb will go through five feet of steel. You can't put a six-foot steel wall around your car or your furnace. The big problem is to cause an explosion without causing these rays. That problem may be solved in 25 years. It will be done by a man or woman less than 25 years old; some youngster now in high school or kindergarten maybe in 1975 or in the year 2000.

The scientist also told of new discoveries in the field of medicine.

"Science is so far ahead of our knowledge of the human being that the situation is dangerous," Dr. Wendt said. "Biological study has lagged far behind. Millions have died because of ignorance. We are solving some of our problems because we are beginning to learn something about our bodies. Life expectancy was 25 years in early Greek times. The life expectancy of children born now is 70.3 years for girls and 66.7 years for boys. The rest of us have received several years of life for nothing because of medical research."

Speaking on the topic of electronics, Dr. Wendt said "Our electronic machines are far ahead of the human senses, hearing, seeing and feeling."

Dr. Wendt referred to another field of development by stating that "The day of the automatic factory is not far off" and added that John L. Lewis' suggestion for a 30-hour week will some day be achieved. "It means more production with less labor. The big boom will be in recreation."

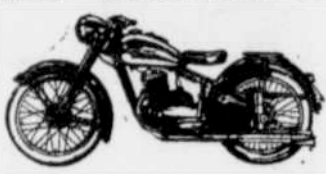
GARDEN CLUB TO MEET

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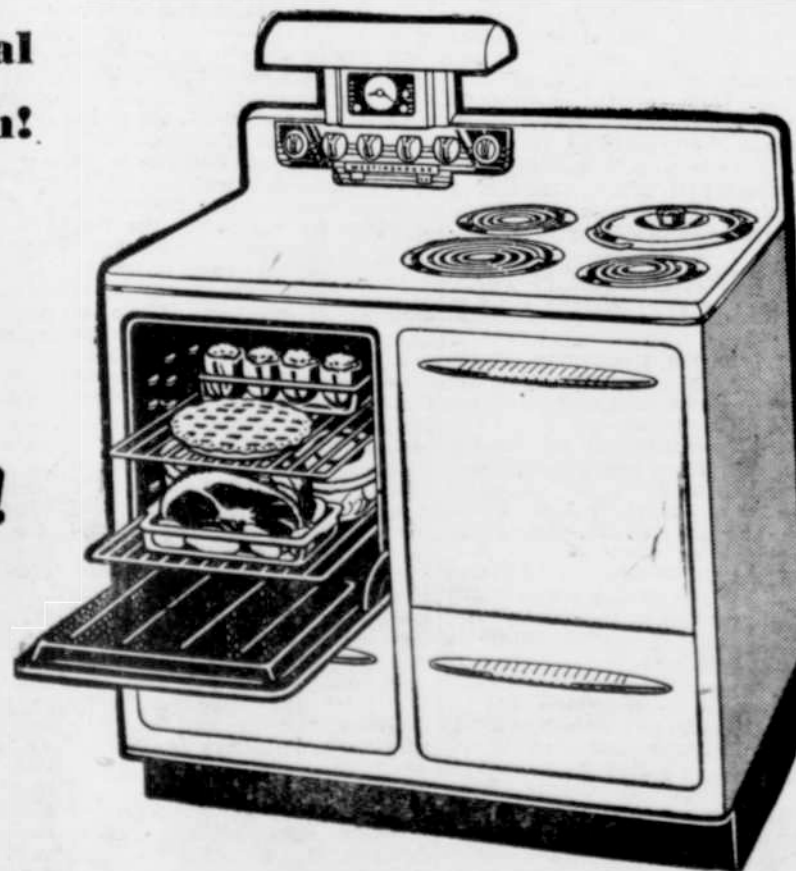
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
