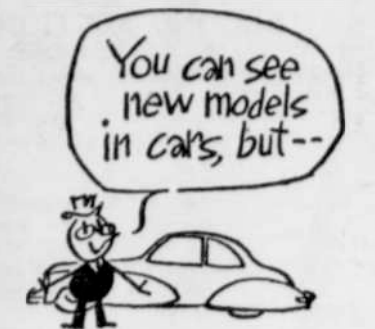


CLUB OF ARCADIA HOLDS MEETING
