SAFE RULES OF DRIVING LISTED

The committee on winter driving hazards of the national council has recently released its report relative to winter traffic accidents. Figures compiled by this committee indicate that total miles driven approaches an annual low point during the months of December and January. However, total fatal accidents during these two winter months are more than twice those during June and July. This tremendous increase in winter vehicle death rates is responsible for the above cited investigation the council said.

"Inadequate traction and reduced visibility are the two major factors found to be responsible for producing the higher winter accident rates," the council stated. "Combined with faulty driving practices, poor traction generally results in skidding, a factor contributing to motor vehicle accidents in winter-time. Reduced visibility in winter driving generally involves one or more of three circumstances—longer hours of darkness, lowered visibility at times of snow or sleet storms, fogs, mists, etc., and obstruction to driver vision from frost, ice, or snow covering windshields.

Chairman Ed Knettle said, "The Nyssa Public Safety council heartily indorses the following fundamental safe driving rules for winter road and weather conditions:

"1. When starting out, get the 'feel' of the road by trying the brakes while driving slowly and

when no other vehicles are near to see how easy it is for the wheels to slide in stopping or accelerating.

"2. Adjust speed to conditions. A good guide to follow is the speed pattern set by the majority of drivers. On glare ice, the recommended maximum safe speed for vehicles not equipped with tire chains is in the range of 10 to 20 miles per hour.

"3. Follow other vehicles at safe distances. The recommended practice is to follow other vehicles at a distance which will permit a stop or allow ample room for maneuvering out of danger if the vehicle ahead should suddenly come to a standstill.

"4. Use tire chains when driving on icy and snowey road surfaces since they are the most effective and practical form of self-help for the motorist in increasing traction. Tire chains reduce passenger car braking distances on ice and snow around 40 to 50 per cent and 60 to 70 per cent for trucks.

"5. Use an intermittent brake application. Normal application of brakes on an icy or snowy surface may lock the wheels and throw the vehicle out of control.

"6. Keep the windshield and

windows clear of outside snow and ice and inside fog and frost at all

times. Lower the side windows, if necessary, to maintain side vision."

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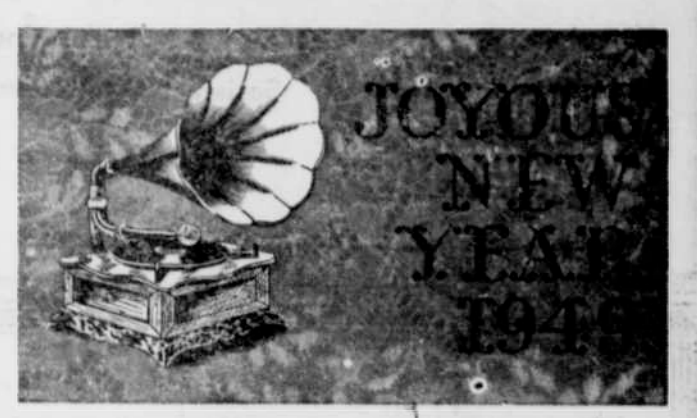
