

**OWYHEE PATRONS VOTING ON BONDS**

SUNSET VALLEY, Jan. 20—Between 2 and 7 p. m. on February 4, the residents of Owyhee school district No. 18 will vote on the \$31,500 bond issue necessary to build a new school building, as the district previously voted against consolidation, and the present schoolhouse is condemned by the state board as not having the minimum standard state requirements.

The blueprints for the new building provide the requirements necessary to meet state approval. Plans for the new building to be erected 30 feet east of the present schoolhouse.

A ramp entrance will lead to the structure, which will be 160 feet long and 46 feet wide. Interior and exterior walls are to be of 8x16 pumice tile blocks, and roofing of asphalt. Floors are to be 18 inches above the grade, all of concrete, covered with asphalt, except the back hallway which will be wood.

Four large classrooms forming the length of the north side are planned. Each classroom will measure 23 by 36, and will include in each room, recessed wardrobes that are open, accessible and ventilated.

A hall running east and west the length of the building will divide the four classrooms on the north from the south side, which is divided into boiler room, coal storage, a health and teacher's room, and lavatories for girls and boys. One of the requirements included in the plans, locates the wash basins and lavatories for the primary children adjoining their primary classroom, and not across the hall as for the older groups. Primary children also have an additional separate exit for the play area. A coal furnace with steam heating is planned.
