115 PERSONS ATTEND FARM LOAN MEETING

The annual meeting of the Payette National Farm Loan association held in the Portia Club hall Thursday, February 3, was attended by more than 115 members and guests.

The meeting opened with a luncheon served by the ladies of the Methodist church. William Hoover, president of the association, who presided at the meeting, told the group that because the association is a cooperative owned by the farmers who use its services, earnings and other advantages accruing to it are shared with its farmer-owners and that the association is again distributing annual cash dividends totaling \$3202. This is the fourth successive annual dividend declared by the association.

Willard Rees, regional manager, the principal speaker pointed out that the Federal Land Bank of Spokane is owned by 74 national farm loan associations in Montana, Idaho, Oregon and Washington and that these associations have received from the bank, during the past five years, dividends approximating one million dollars.

The financial report and a summary of the association's activities during the past year was given by Herbert J. Davis, secretary-treasurer. Mr. Davis reported that the association closed new loans in excess of \$112,000 during the period and that its surplus and reserve accounts had been further increased as the result of the year's operations.

William Hoover of Weiser and D. H. Ireland of Fruitland were re-elected directors of the association. Holdover directors are A. R. Heap of Fruitland, Charles Howland of Weiser, and William Downs of Ontario.
