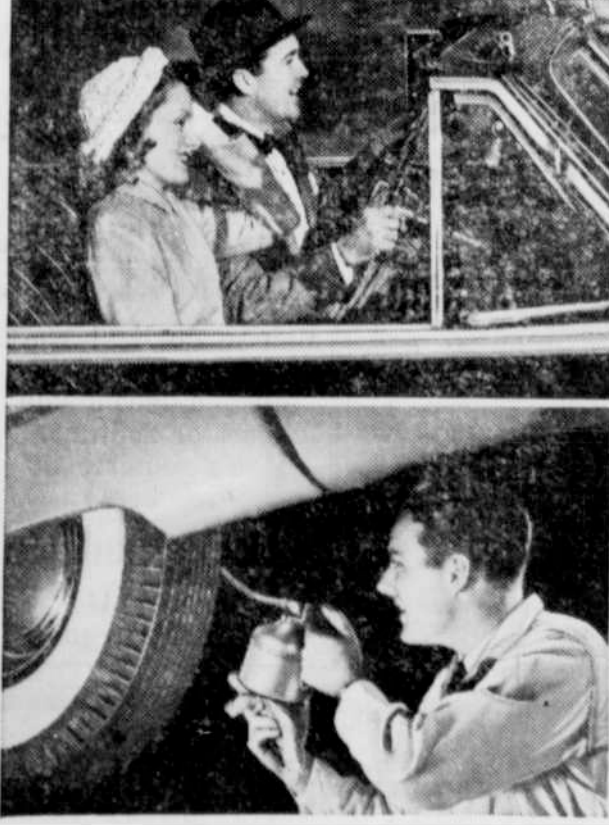

CO. 4-H CLUB HAS GOOD PROSPECTS

Four H club work has prospects for another banner year, according to E. M. Hauser, county extension agent. At present there are 82 clubs organized with members carrying 1,097 projects. And there are still a number of crops and livestock clubs to be organized during the next few weeks.

"Last year saw the greatest enrollment in 4-H club work Malheur county has ever had," Hauser said. "There were 990 different club members enrolled, and these boys and girls completed 11,074 projects. In addition participation in club activities, such as spring fair, summer school, camps, and county fair, was at an all-time high.

"Oregon 4-H club work is now 34 years of age, having been established in 1914, Hauser states. In that time the program has grown to a state enrollment of 26,000. Nationally 1,800,000 youngsters belong to 4-H clubs in every county in the United States and in Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

Club members all over the county were active in observing National 4-H club week. Special meetings, exhibits, and radio programs were used to call attention to the work club members are doing and to interest other boys and girls in joining 4-H clubs.
