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Notice to Water Users

In order that water may be more equally distributed for use in irrigating lawns and gardens, and to maintain fire protection, the provisions of Ordinance No. 288 prescribing the use of water for irrigating purposes will be enforced.

Beginning May 1st, 1949 water may be used for irrigation only between the hours of 6 A. M. and 12 M., and between the hours of 5 P. M. and 10 P. M. Also, in event of an alarm for fire, all irrigation water shall be shut off immediately.

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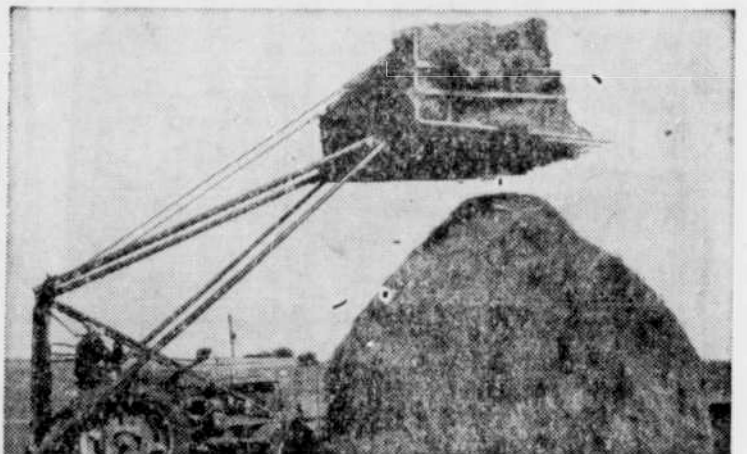

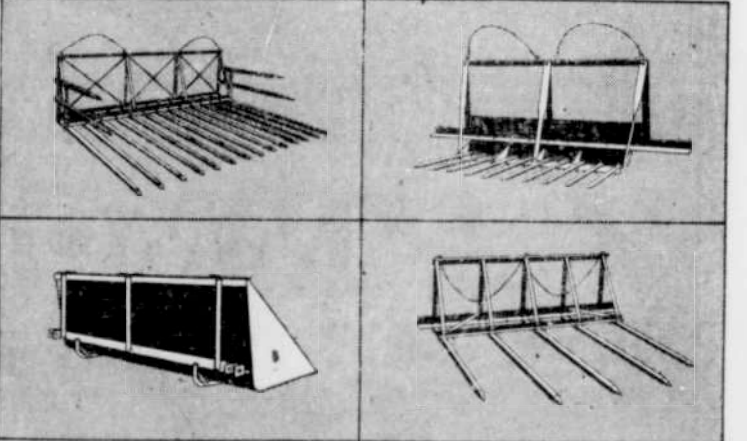
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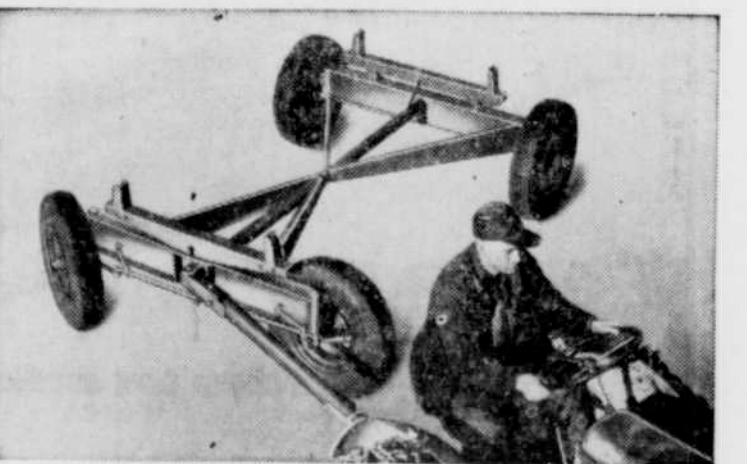
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
