

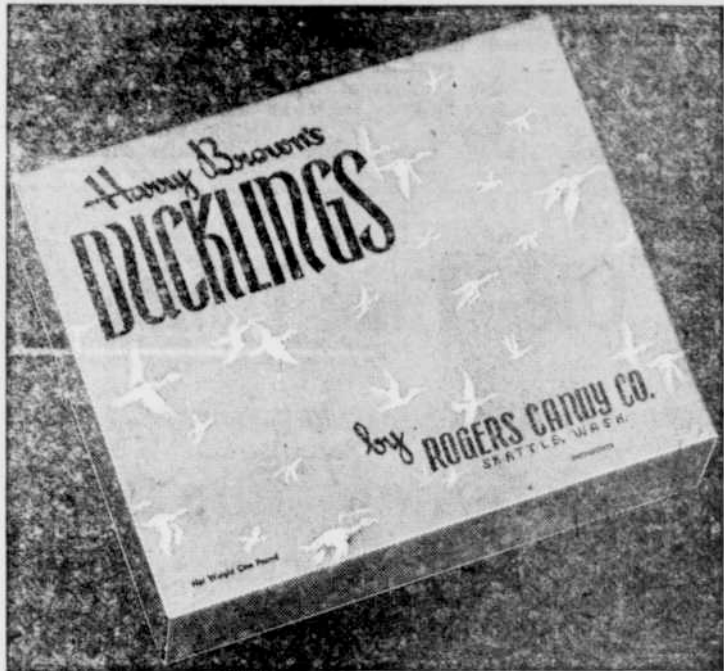
IGOR GORIN WILL SING IN ONTARIO

Here From Washington—Mr. and Mrs. Earl Campbell and son, Ellsworth, of Richland, Washington visited over the week-end at the David Beers home.



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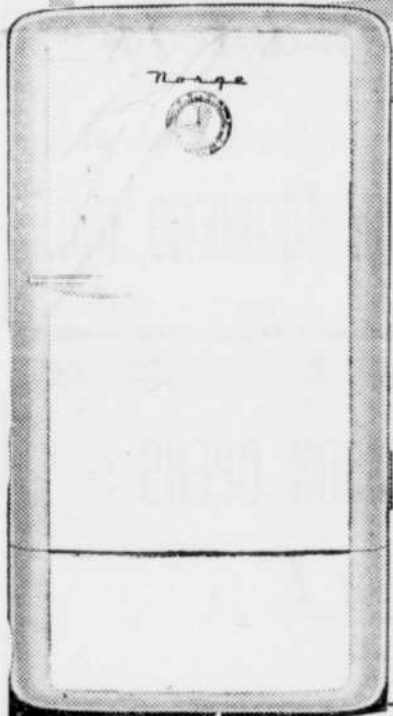
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YOUTH MEETING WELL ATTENDED
