The Merry Matrons club met at the home of Gladys Byers Wednesday afternoon, May 11. 10 members answered roll call with "Some-

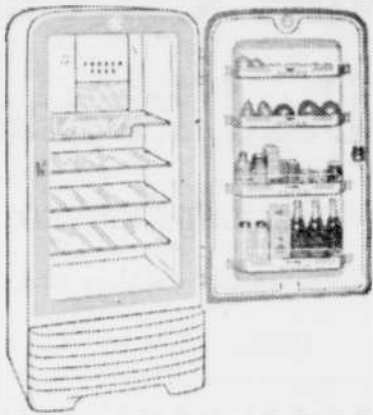
