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Machine Shop, Appliance Store Destroyed By Flames In Nyssa

Heavy Loss Sustained By Carl Roth, Burt Haney, Ostrom Brothers

Nyssa's most spectacular fire in several months virtually destroyed a building occupied by Carl and Burt's machine shop and Ostrom Brothers Appliance company store on First street Tuesday night with a loss estimated at from \$30,000 to \$35,000.

Nothing was saved by the two firms, with the exception of the records of Carl Roth and Burton Haney, which were recovered from the machine shop office, located at the opposite end of the building from where the fire started.

Flames were bursting from the cement block building even before firemen were notified. One crew of four firemen, engaging in a fire drill, saw the black smoke billowing from the machine shop several blocks away and raced for the scene in the fire truck as a telephone operator sounded the fire siren. Other volunteer firemen soon arrived on the scene, but were handicapped by lack of water, caused by so much tawn sprinkling in the city. Two more fire warnings were given on the siren to signal property owners to stop their sprinkling. The water pressure quickly climbed and firemen soon had the blaze under control, although the main battle lasted for three-quarters of an hour.

With a light wind blowing from the north, fear developed that the fire might spread to nearby buildings. The fire attacked an electric light pole near the rear of the building and forced the power company to turn off the lights in the Main street block just west of the machine shop building.

Fearing explosion of a large butane gas storage tank a short distance from the flames, firemen threw some water onto the tank occasionally, but Wilton Jackson, owner of the Ideal Gas and Appliance company, and Walter Freeman, who established the machine shop and gas business and later sold them, said Wednesday morning there was no danger of the tank exploding because of safety valves fixed in the tank.

Cause of the fire, starting at the rear of the building, has not been determined. Apparently there was little inside the large building to burn, but the flames soon devoured the girders and rear part of the roof and gradually ate its way toward the middle of the building. As it moved forward, the rear wall and part of the side walls crumpled. The fire damaged all of the machinery, but some of it can be salvaged. The flames damaged an automobile owned by Brian Davis, a low-slung two-wheel trailer owned by J. H. Wise and Son, and a motorcycle owned by an unidentified youth.

Considerable difference of opinion has developed over whether an explosion occurred before or after the fire started. One man, walking nearby, said he saw the rear wall fall outward, but heard no explosion. Other persons said they definitely heard an explosion. One fireman said a gasoline can exploded, but apparently the gasoline tank in the automobile did not explode.

Fire Chief Frank Morris said the terrific accumulation of oily smoke could possibly have developed enough pressure in the building to cause an explosion.

The flames did not reach inside the appliance store, separated from the machine shop by a partition, to any great extent, but all of the appliances, wallpaper and other items suffered from smoke damage. Loss on the \$3500 stock was estimated at 75 per cent.

Walter Freeman estimated the loss on the machine shop and contents at \$30,000. The loss to both businesses was well covered by insurance.

The building is expected to be rebuilt as soon as possible, with prospects that work will be started by August 1.

Carl Roth and Burton Haney, who will attend to their business affairs in the Ideal Gas and Appliance office, expressed thanks "to the firemen and others who helped us in any way during the time of our trouble."

Mrs. Sayles, daughter of S. D. Goshart, former Nyssa postmaster, was employed in the Nyssa post office for a time before moving to the Willamette valley.

Mrs. Sayles was born June 22, 1915 at Nyssa, a daughter of Sylvester D. and Anna E. Goshart. She was married September 17, 1929 to Harry C. Sayles and moved to Aloha three years ago. Mrs. Sayles was a member of Golden Rule chapter No. 131, O. E. S. of Nyssa. She died following an operation for removal of a brain tumor.

Besides her husband and father, Mrs. Sayles is survived by two daughters, Mrs. David MacFadden and Willean Sayles; a son, Harry Sayles, and a sister, Mrs. Marion Klinkenberg.

Best Regatta In Nyssa's History Is Given Sunday

The greater speed of the four-cylinder, 60 H. P. racer over that of the more conventional type of motor boat was aptly demonstrated last Sunday in the most successful regatta ever held by the Nyssa Boat club.

The 4-60 boats appeared for the first time in a Nyssa regatta before an estimated crowd of 2000 persons, who spent the afternoon from 2 o'clock until 5 o'clock eating "hot dogs" and drinking pop sold by the Eagles lodge, watching the races, boat drill and ski and surfboard riding and taking rides in the greatest galaxy of boats ever assembled on the Snake river at Nyssa.

With the judges, Ken Battin, Jay Bybee and Howard Lovejoy, sitting on a raft in the middle of the river, the program was started with a drill given by eight boatmen operating inboard boats, led by Murle Marcum and Dale Garrison.

A. H. Orvis of Boise, West of Boise and V. A. Walsh of Boise raced close together in the 20-cubic foot race for three laps, but Orvis took a big lead in the fourth lap and finished with a wide margin to spare.

In a fishing boat race, Tracy Mefford of Nyssa held the lead and the inside position most of the way but finished behind Jay Bybee of Nyssa by half a length.

Beverly Martin and Colleen Rumley of Payette gave an interesting demonstration of surfboard riding, including headstands and riding double.

Six entered the 22 H. P. C service boats race, but only four finished. The first three, Dale Gross of Nampa, T. L. Scott of Nampa and Dale Garrison of Nyssa, finishing in that order drove a tight race all the way.

With only two entered in the race, Stanley Hill and Bob Webster, both of Adrian, raced neck and neck in the 33 H. P. run-about class for a long distance, but Webster finally won by two lengths.

Orvis out-distanced George Schiemer of Adrian by half a lap in the 50 H. P. race for runabouts.

Traveling part of the time at 60 miles an hour, Art Godfrey of Nampa won the race for four-cylinder, 60 horsepower boats by six lengths over Bob Gilliam of Nampa. Orvis was third.

Still piloting his 4-60 hydroplane, Godfrey defeated E. R. Roberts and Jumbo Godfrey, who were driving 135-cubic foot racing boats.

Survivors are four daughters, Mrs. Beatrice Wildman of San Francisco, Mrs. Lois Callas of Santa Barbara, Mrs. Pauline Eldridge of Portland, and Mrs. Mildred Robinson of Portland; two sons, C. A. Forbes of San Francisco and O. W. Forbes of Portland, eight grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

All of the sons and daughters are here for the funeral service, which will be held in the Methodist church Friday at 2 p. m. with Rev. Donald S. Campbell officiating. Interment will be in the family plot in the Nyssa cemetery.
