Search in the Postal Guide revealed the collector was wrong. There's no post office named Harry (unless Harryhogan, Va. is acceptable) but there is a Truman, Minn.

Alma McLing, who's developed considerable enthusiasm for stamps since she began working for W. S. C., was curious about the Minnesota town with the president's surname and wrote the postmaster for information.

It was named after Truman Whitehead, who surveyed the town,

which was founded in 1899.

Mrs. McLing and her husband, "Slim", published the Gate City Journal many years ago.



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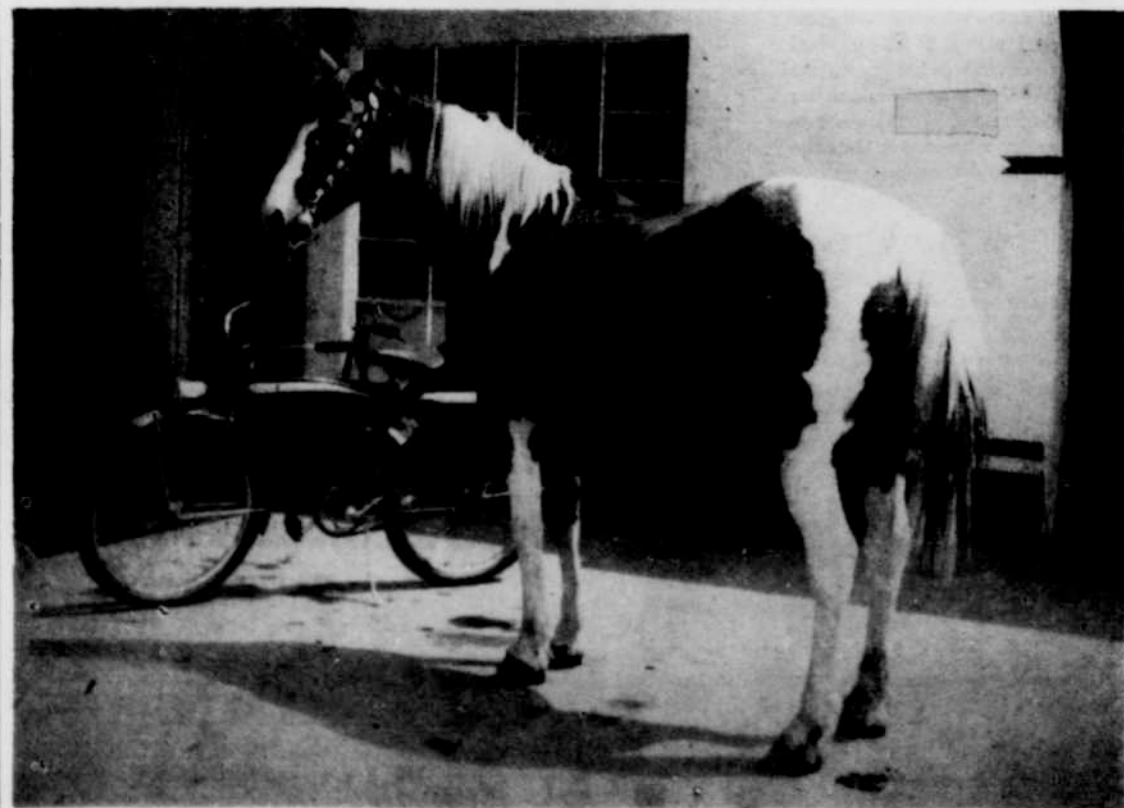
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
