

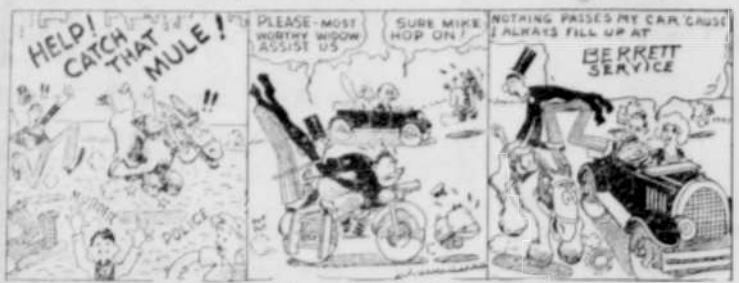
Social Notes
