Herrman Cows High In County

The Holstein herd of 19 cows belonging to Leroy Herrman of Nyssa was high herd in the County DHIA association for the month of June with an average production of 43.83 pounds of butterfat per cow. Ronald Lane, testing supervisor for the association, said that two other herds in the group now being tested passed the 40-pound mark. The herd of 34 Jerseys belonging to Clifford Wright of Nyssa had an average production of 41.94 and the Holstein herd of W. W. and Ed Ker of Oregon Slope, consisting of 28 cows, had an average of 40.11 pounds of butterfat. Lane also pointed out that a herd of 14 Jerseys belonging to James Peterson of Adrian, which has been high for three previous months, still ranks in the top four with an average of 39.84. Herds belonging to Louis Wettstein of Ontario and Lee Stoker of Nyssa were both near the 40-pound line. Other herds in the association produced more than 30 pounds of butterfat belonging to D. L. Hurst of Adrian, Gilbert Sprout of Oregon Slope, Beaumont and Tombs of Adrian and Lawrence Clevley of Nyssa. A Jersey cow from the Clifford Wright herd was the highest producing cow with an individual record of 78.3 pounds butterfat. The second highest producing cow was a Holstein belonging to Ed Ker with an average of 69.8 pounds of butterfat. The third place in the association went to a Jersey cow from the Peterson herd with a record of 69.2. Lane reported that herds of 727 cows were tested during the month.
