VETS ALLOWANCES HALTED JULY 25

All payments for veterans readjustment allowance (commonly known as \$2-20) ceased the week of July 25 for veterans discharged from active service prior to July, 1947, according to H. L. Arment, manager of the state unemployment office at Ontario. This applies to both unemployed and self-employed claimants.

Small number of veterans who were discharged subsequently to July, 1947 and who were currently in action duty through October, 1946 will still be eligible for benefits. These claims will be valid until two years from date of discharge unless some disqualifying factor is present or appears after the filing of an otherwise valid claim.

Self-employed claimants who are eligible should file for July claims after August 1, 1949, but not later than August 31, 1949.
