The rodeo was opened each night with the grand entry of cowboys and cowgirls and the introduction of officials, including Queen Betty Domenico and her attendants, Sonya Millard and Lila Mae Holmes, who assisted later with hazing the animals into the catch pens.

The junior drill team of Nyssa and the Adrian 4-H club drill team gave drills and the Circle V Riding club of Vale presented a mounted quadrille the first night of the show. Drill teams participating during the last two nights were the Canyon county sheriff's posse, the Indianhead Riding club of Weiser, the Ada county posse, and the Black Canyon Riding club of Emmet.

The Lane girls trio gave an outstanding acrobatic act each evening with their boy friend, Homer, furnishing the comedy. Also each evening Cy Ritter gave a humorous performance with his "Tail-spin Lizzie".
