

Tobler Softies Win City Title

Tober's Feed and Fuel softball team won the city championship by defeating the Waggoner Motor company team 5 to 2 in a tight pitchers duel between Tommy Holman of Tobler's and Bob Wilson of Waggoner's Thursday night to close the regular season, which was sponsored by the Nyssa Lions club, with Charles Landreth, Lawrence Findling and Richard Mikkelson in charge.

In the championship contest, Bob Church, Tommy Holman and Ron Smith led the attack with two hits each. Calvin Wilson made a home run for the winners. Ralph Lowe led the losers with a triple.

The Ontario Tractor company softball team broke loose in the fourth and fifth innings to defeat the Western Corrugator company team 13 to 1 after being held to a 2 to 1 score for three innings.

Dale Bingman and Dale Moss led the winners' assault with two hits each. George Harteloo of the Implement team also made two hits.

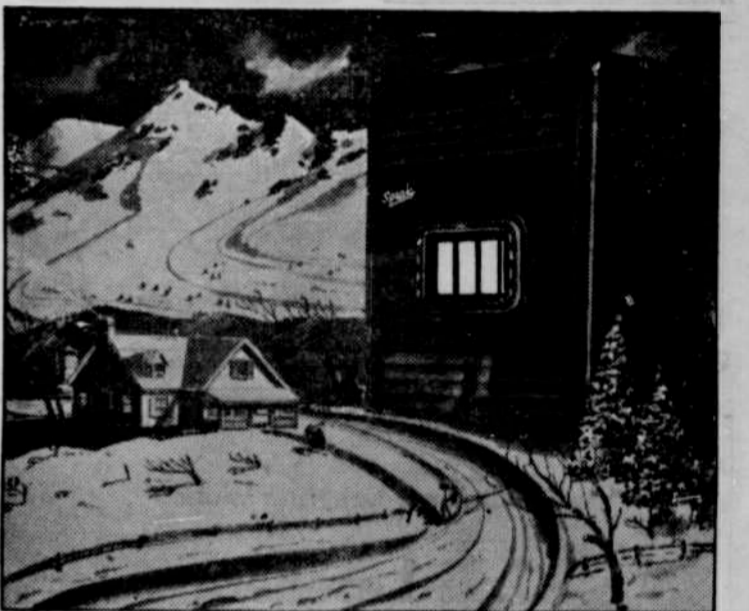
