Also expected to exhibit dairy cattle are Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Hight, whose registered Guernseys will be on display at the Western Idaho State fair this week. Announcing their intention to show cattle from their Holstein herds are LeRoy Herman and Lee G. Anderson. Harry Hill will again exhibit animals in the Spotted Poland China swine division.

FFA and 4-H members will also be on hand to represent Nyssa, as will the A. N. K. garden club, which plans to have a flower display. Nyssa's Oregon Trail Grange will again be represented in the Grange booth contest. This Grange has taken first place the past two years in very keen Grange booth competition. With entry day scheduled for August 31, more and more Nyssa names will be added to the list of fair exhibitors, sponsors said.

In the commercial exhibits space has been sold to Ideal Gas & Appliance, Brower Plumbing company, Waggoner Motor company, B & M Equipment company, Armo Drainage and Metal Products, Inc. and the Owyhee Truck & Implement company. In addition to these displays, many local automobile dealers will be included in the joint county-wide auto show, which will be held at the fair grounds.

Hospital Group Planning Drive

Chest X-rays To Be Taken Here

Volunteer workers, who started their campaign Wednesday, will call on every home in Malheur county to urge participation in the annual chest X-ray survey to be held in the county from August 10 through September 23.

Mrs. Charles P. Flegel, county X-ray chairman, announced that the canvassers will sign every person in their area who is 15 years of age and older in order that each may be given an appointment for a chest X-ray when the mobile unit arrives in their town.

Persons not at home at the time the volunteers call and wish to make an appointment may call or write the Malheur County Tuberculosis and Health association, Ontario, or contact Rev. Don R. Maxfield, chairman of the Nyssa survey.

"In effect," Mr. Maxfield said, "the solicitors are looking for approximately 20 persons in this area who have dangerously active tuberculosis. The chances that you have dangerously active T. B. are about 250 to one. So play safe and have your chest X-rayed for your own protection and the protection of others. Nearly everyone is infected with tuberculosis germs, which are but waiting for the proper body conditions due to fatigue, etc. to go to work and become dangerous. If you feel all right you should have a chest X-ray for you may have T. B. in the early stages when it is easily treated."

"Take time for an X-ray and perhaps save your life, for the chest X-ray also reveals unusual growths of the chest and certain kinds of heart trouble, as well as T. B."

Preparations for the opening of Nyssa schools Tuesday, September 6 are developing, with administrative officers and others working this week to perfect plans for the event.

D. W. Patch, high school principal, and W. L. McPartland, principal of the elementary and junior schools, started work Monday, August 22. Others assisting with preparations are Charles Steffens, vice principal of the high school; Mrs. Charles Steffens, home-making instructor, and R. V. Wilson, vocational agriculture instructor. The elementary faculty will spend most of Tuesday morning registering and assigning youngsters to classes and schools. Those parents living in town who desire their youngsters to attend either the Arcadia or Oregon Trail schools should call the superintendent's office prior to school opening and make their wishes known. The Oregon Trail and Arcadia schools enroll youngsters in the first, second and third grades.

Children entering the first grade must be six years of age prior to November 15. This regulation is the law in Oregon and no exceptions can be made. Superintendent Hartley said. Younger children entering school through error will be sent home when the discrepancy is discovered.

High school youngsters will spend Tuesday morning going through a short schedule, including the receiving of assignments. The administration urges all prospective high school students to register during the week of August 29. The registration schedule is as follows: August 29, seniors; August 30, juniors; August 31, sophomores, and September 1, freshmen. The hours of registration are from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. except on August 30 and 31, when, in addition, the building will be open from 7 to 9 p. m. for those who cannot register during the day.

A general faculty meeting will be held in the elementary building beginning at 9:30 Monday, September 5. After the general meeting, the faculties of the various schools will convene to prepare organizational plans for their buildings. During the afternoon, teachers will have an opportunity to draw supplies and books and make preparations for receiving the students on the following day.

City Is Filling Valley Gutters
