

New Linotype Is Put In Operation

The new model 31 linotype of the Nyssa Gate City Journal was placed in full operation this week, with the arrival of additional matrices for the machine.

The principal feature of this latest model type-setting machine lies in its flexibility to produce all types of composition, ranging from display type, used in newspaper headings and advertisements to ordinary news type. The machine is equipped with 10 new type faces, as compared to two type faces available on the old machine, so that only the larger type needed in the newspaper will be hand-set.

The new type will give the front page and advertisements of this newspaper an entirely different appearance. Anyone comparing this week's issue with previous copies will quickly notice the difference.

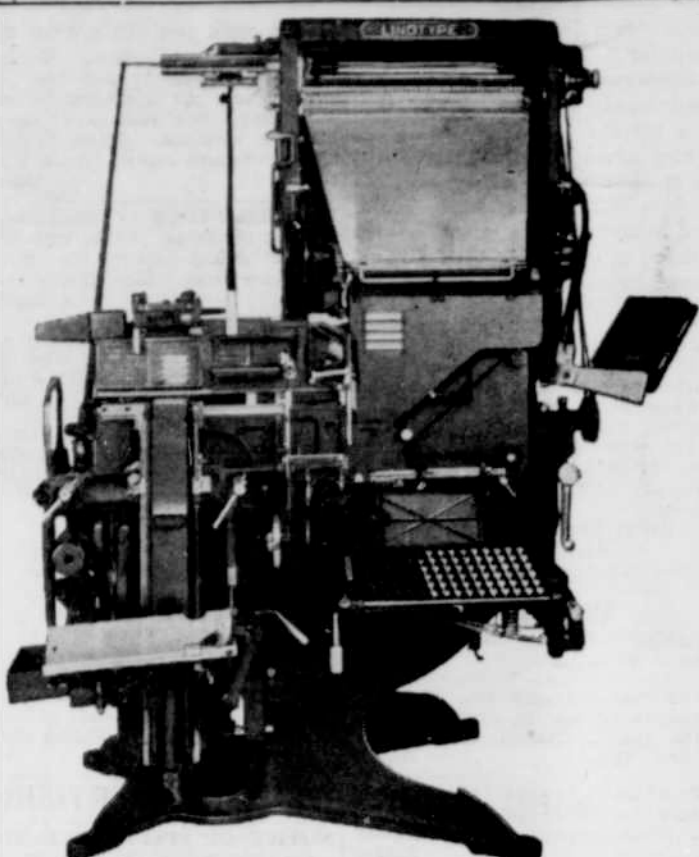
The principal purpose of the Journal publishers in buying the

linotype is to facilitate production and thus increase efficiency needed to keep the newspaper abreast of the growth of the community, both now and in the future. The new machine and type will also speed up production and enhance the appearance of many types of commercial printing. The linotype will be added to a growing list of modern equipment purchased during the last eight years for the commercial printing department.

With the old linotype still on the floor for supplemental use, the concern will have sufficient type-setting equipment to meet its needs for several years to come. The publishers said they feel their faith in the development of this section justified the expenditure.
