

Regulation On Potatoes Asked

POCATELLO, Sept. 1 (Special)—A recommendation designed to curb marketing of immature Irish

potatoes in Idaho and in Malheur county, Oregon, has been made to the secretary of the United States department of agriculture by the committee charged with responsibility for administering the federal potato marketing order in that growing area.

Committee Chairman Frank N. Campbell of Rupert said that the

committee had recommended that no handler be allowed to ship during the period beginning at a time yet to be announced and ending November 1, any potatoes of the Russet variety which, in addition to grade and size requirements, do not meet the maturity requirements of "moderately skinned"—which means that not more than 10 percent of the potatoes in any lot have more than one-half of the skin missing or "feathered" (evidences of immaturity)—provided that the requirement of this maturity regulation shall not apply to the first 200 cwt. offered for shipment by any one grower during the period in which this regulation is in effect.

Chairman Campbell said that under terms of the recommendation, each handler would be required to report to the committee shipments of any potatoes which did not meet the requirements of this order and which were shipped under the 200 cwt. exemption.

Committee members said that they believed no potatoes would be withheld from market because of this regulation, but that it would serve to keep immature potatoes in the ground until they were ready for digging.

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The first daughter of Commander of Prairie Bloom G. 59, one of the Guernsey sires in use by the Oregon Dairy Breeders, has just completed her first lactation period. Her official record based on two-time a day milking for the 395-day period is 19,673 pounds of milk and 533 pounds of butterfat, figured on a mature equivalent basis.

This young sire has been in use by the Oregon Dairy Breeders since

the Malheur Dairy Breeders association was organized in August, 1947. Royce Roberts, manager of the local unit said there have been more than 300 cows sired by this bull here. He said that local dairymen are well pleased with the heifers they have by the commander. Within the year many of these heifers owned by Malheur dairymen will be in production.

Hearing In Idaho Power Case Set

A hearing on a temporary injunction against the Idaho Power company to prevent construction of a \$3,000,000 power line across federal land was postponed until September 6 in federal district court Monday in Boise.

Change in the date for the hearing, which had been set for Monday, was upon stipulation of counsel for the power company and the government.

The Idaho Power company asked dismissal of the suit in an answer to the government's complaint. The company asked that a temporary restraining order issued by Federal Judge Chase A. Clark be terminated and that temporary and permanent restraining orders be denied.

The power company also asked dismissal of the government's complaint, which charged the company with trespass on the public domain in construction of transmission lines from the Bliss power plant to Boise and American Falls. The company said in its reply that it would be unable to transmit sufficient power from its Hagerman valley plants to peak load centers in southeastern Idaho and eastern Oregon without the new lines.—Idaho Statesman.

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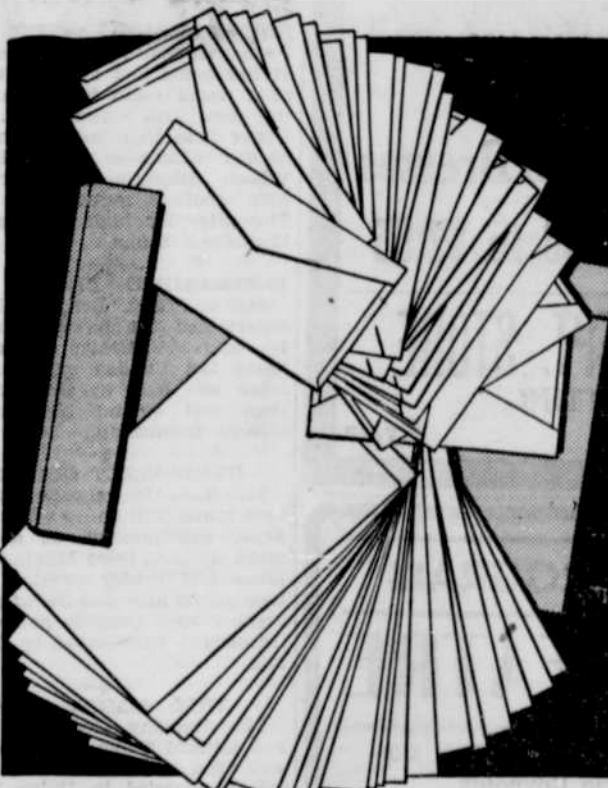
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
