## EXPANDING FIRE DEPARTMENT AND LIBRARY

If the residents of Nyssa vote next Tuesday in favor of a bond issue of \$17,000 for construction of an addition to the city hall for space for a rural fire truck and greater library space, the residents of the city and rural areas will have an opportunity to co-operate to the mutual benefit of both.

Residents of the rural area, for the protection of their properties against fire, have organized the Nyssa Rural Fire Protection district, with the assistance of the Nyssa fire department. The district expects to buy fire fighting equipment when a suitable building is made available for it. In return for the use of the rural fire truck on city fire when it is needed, the city is expected to provide space for the machine in the fire department building. The expense to the district and the city will be about the same, an estimated \$12,000. In effect, the city will have double the protection that it now has and will probably enjoy a lower fire insurance rate. As a part of the tentative agreement, city firemen will operate the rural truck.

In addition to adding to the fire department, the city plans, if the bond issue is approved, to triple the space for the city library, which is inadequately housed now in a corner of the city hall. The city will also provide meeting quarters and other facilities for the firemen, who spend long hours of their time in studying protection and actually protecting the properties of local residents. The city may also enlarge the jail by moving the police office from the basement to the present library space.

These improvements will probably run the cost of the entire project to approximately \$17,000, which is certainly not excessive for a program to improve our fire department and library.

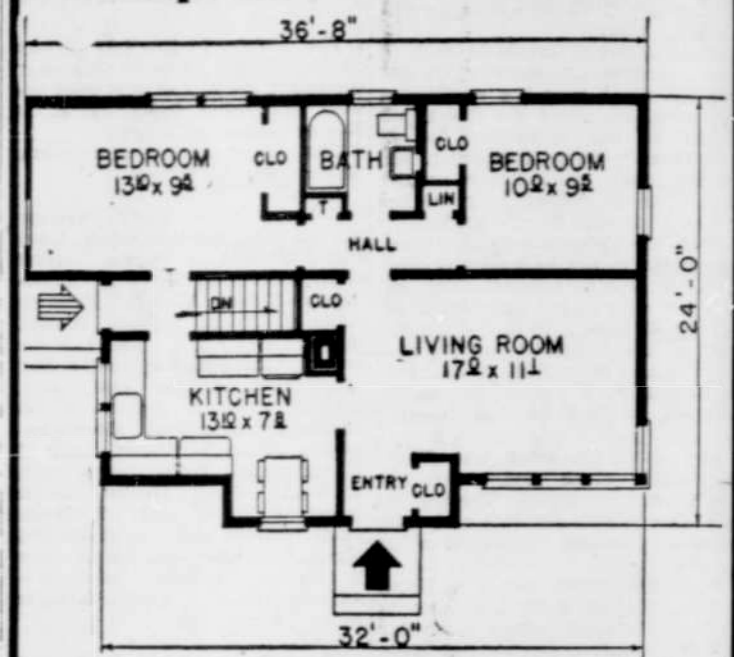
