The churches of Nyssa are co-operating in a city-wide religious survey to be conducted the week of September 18.
Volunteer lay workers from the churches will call at every home to obtain information relative to church affiliation and interest. This is part of a community-wide study the churches are conducting in order that they may more adequately provide for the moral and spiritual needs of the Nyssa community, the ministers said.
The survey will cover just the city and areas immediately adjacent to it. However, plans are being made to survey the rural areas later in the fall.

X-Ray Unit Is Coming Friday

The Oregon Tuberculosis association chest X-ray unit will be in Nyssa Friday, September 16 at the high school and Monday, September 19 at the city hall. The post-ers and previous publicity has stated that the unit would be at the high school both days, but at the suggestion and request of many persons, sponsors decided to have the unit at the city hall Monday.
"The cooperation of all who signed for the chest x-ray and those who did not is needed to make the effort a success," said chairman Don Maxfield. "If 1,000 people do not cooperate, then we will have missed three or four people who have dangerously active T. B., if the average in Nyssa follows the national average of one person out of 50 having T. B. Your cooperation is needed. Please help by keeping your appointments and by coming to the unit for an x-ray, even though you do not have an appointment."

"The hours of the x-ray are from 9 to 1 and 2 to 6 on both Friday and Monday. The hours 12 to 1 and 2 to 3 on Friday are reserved primarily for farm folks. The hours from 11 to 12 and 3 to 6 will be the best hours for businessmen and those without appointments to attend. However, those persons who have no appointment may come at any time, for there will be a few who can not keep their scheduled appointments. You will be x-rayed even though you do not have an appointment card, but if you do have your appointment card, you are asked to bring it."

"There will be workers at the unit who will care for small children for the few moments that it takes to have your chest x-rayed. Women are asked to wear skirt and blouse where possible, rather than a dress. All disrobing is done in private and all women are provided with gowns."

"Through the main purpose in having a chest x-ray is to discover T. B., tumorous growths, cancer, heart trouble, and other abnormalities are disclosed. The x-ray is free, and the results are confidential."

Funeral Held For Lewis H. Findling

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 in the Nyssa Funeral home chapel for Lewis Henry Findling of Nyssa, who died September 7 while working at the Anderson feed mill. Rev. Don Maxfield of the First Christian church officiated. Interment was in the Nyssa cemetery.

Mr. Findling was born in Beatrice, Nebraska July 5, 1884. As a youth he united with the Christian church and in 1907 was married to Amy Tittle in Fairbury, Nebraska. To this union were born Clarence Findling of Nyssa, Mrs. Louella Fielder of Ellis, Nebraska, Donald Findling, who died in infancy, Cecil Findling and Mrs. Lucille Friday, both of Conrad, Iowa, and Kenneth of Nyssa. Mr. and Mrs. Findling lived in Diller, Nebraska until the fall of 1943, when they moved to Nyssa. During part of his residence in Nyssa, Mr. Findling was employed by the city of Nyssa and the Amalgamated Sugar company.

Besides his widow and children, Mr. Findling is survived by 14 grandchildren, one great grandson, and a brother, William of Nyssa.

Idaho Power To Resume Line Work

The hearing opened Wednesday on the proposed issuance of a permanent injunction to prevent the Idaho Power company from constructing a \$3,000,000 power transmission line on government property was recessed by Judge Charles C. Cavanah until 4 p. m. today.

In a rather short session held Wednesday, the federal power commission contended that the company did not have its permission to build the line.
Construction of Idaho Power company's transmission lines from Bliss to Boise and American Falls, halted August 6 by court action instituted by the department of interior, will be resumed immediately, T. E. Roach, president of the company announced.

"There's a deadline of December 15 to be met in the public interest," he declared. "That deadline is the date on which we estimate the winter peak demand for electricity will occur in southern Idaho and eastern Oregon. The peak demand will approximate 240,000 kilowatts, and without the new transmission lines the company will be prepared to deliver only 194,700 kilowatts in December and an additional 25,000 kilowatts in February."

"The size of Idaho Power company's electric load is beyond its control and is determined entirely by its customers. The company has an obligation under law to supply this electric load, whatever it may be, to the people of the area it serves. We have never failed in that obligation, and will not fail this year unless further obstructed by the department of interior."

Roach pointed out that findings of fact in the federal court were that no serious, immediate or irreparable damage would be done by transmission line construction across government land, and that there is a public necessity for completion of the lines by December.

"The company fully recognizes the rights of the United States, and that it can obtain its right-of-way only from the United States, subject to all lawful rules and regulations," he said. "It made

proper application for license covering the lines in question with the federal power commission April 20, 1949, and received pre-license authorization to begin construction. It further believes that under the law the federal power commission is the only agency of the United States having jurisdiction."
"The controversy in this case arises over the efforts of the department of interior to assert jurisdiction and to demand conditions which the company believes to be unlawful, unauthorized and harmful to the interest of its customers and security holders."
