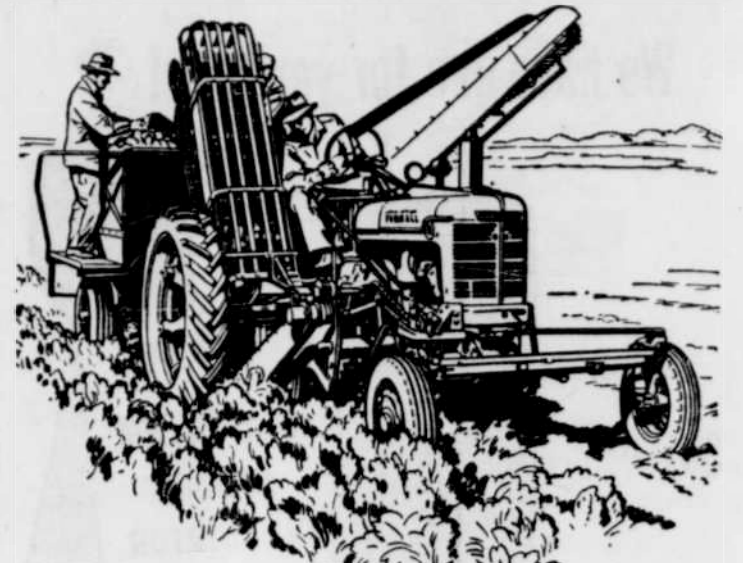
After a short wedding trip, the couple will be at home in Corvallis.
