Union Petition Given Support

The union supporters of the movement to recall County Judge Irwin Troxell have more than enough signers of their petitions to call the recall election, Charles Collins, president of the Teamsters union in Ontario, said today.

"But we want to get enough signers to show a lot of strength

before we actually file the petition," he explained.

Collins said that persons carrying the petitions were finding support extensive than the backers of the recall had originally expected. He reported that in one farming district in the county, 29 out of 31 families resident in the district signed the petition.

Earlier this week Ontario saw evidence of increased union activity

here but there was no announcement of any program.

A number of high ranking A. F. of L. officials from the coast areas were in Ontario Tuesday night and met with local men Tuesday night but withheld any comment on plans.

Workers on the county road crew, who had replaced striking county road workmen, discovered this week that they had been officially "black-listed" by Oregon labor unions. They were labeled strike breakers and their names were published in one of the state's labor journals.

The county clerk's office in Vale reported today that it had received a union request for a precinct map of the county. Such a map might be used to facilitate the work of persons campaigning in the county.

Missionary To Speak In Nyssa

Mrs. Esther B. Harvey, who has been under appointment of the general council of the Assemblies of God for foreign mission work in North India for over 35 years, will speak in the Assembly of God church in Sunset valley at 11 a. m. Much of her time has been spent in orphanage and Bible school work. The Harvey memorial has been raised in memory of her husband, who also gave many years of service to the people of India and laid down his life for them.

Mrs. Harvey, who expects to return to her work in the near future, is at present visiting the Assembly of God churches in Oregon in behalf of world missions. She will show slide pictures and a display of curios.

Nyssa Residents Involved In Suits

Three damage cases, one an alienation of affection affair, which were filed in circuit court last week, involved residents of the Nyssa area.

Ira Lovelace of Adrian filed the alienation suit against Howard Lee Holland, asking for \$50,000 compensatory damages and \$35,000 punitive damages or a total of \$85,000. The complainant alleges that he and his wife, Ester, and their three children would have continued to live happily together had not Holland "wrongfully and maliciously with studied effort" alienated the affection of Mrs. Lovelace.

In a suit developing from an accident involving a Union Pacific railroad train on the Homedale branch and an automobile at the Garrison crossing southwest of Nyssa, Mrs. Ranae Folkman Hadley is suing the railroad company for \$35,298, including \$35,000 general damages and \$298 special damages.

Mrs. Hadley alleged in her complaint that the railroad company failed to keep the high weeds and brush cleared from the right-of-way and that the engineer did not sound a whistle or ring a bell. She contends that as a result, the car driven by her husband crashed against the side of the train.

Clarence Phoenix filed suit against Zack Walker and Beaty Lay

for \$982.91 as the result of an auto accident, in which Phoenix alleges his car was damaged in a collision with a truck driven by Lay.
