Mrs. Gerlinger Talks To Women

Mrs. George H. Gerlinger of Portland, chairman of the republican women's council of Oregon, spoke before a group of republican women of Nyssa, Ontario and Vale at a luncheon held last Friday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Frank Morgan. Mrs. Gerlinger challenged the 18 members to recapture the best thinking that had been done by those who believed in the Jeffersonian principles as laid down by the party founders. The party today will go forward only on the sincere conviction of its members in these principles, and the personal participation of each member in party activities. Mrs. Gerlinger urged republican women to study the Hoover report and such current issues as the C. V. A. and socialized medicine, and the reapportionment of the legislature here in Oregon.

Mrs. Gerlinger told of her privilege in San Francisco of hearing Mrs. Pandit, sister of Nehru of India on her recent visit to this country. Mrs. Gerlinger is uniting her efforts with other northwest leaders in getting Mrs. Pandit to visit the northwest.

Dr. Sarazin spoke to the group concerning socialized medicine, as a product of socialistic tendencies that will lead to communism. Dr. Sarazin stated that in no country has medicine ever made the great progress as in this country, and this advance is a result of freedom of thought and action and absence of government control.
