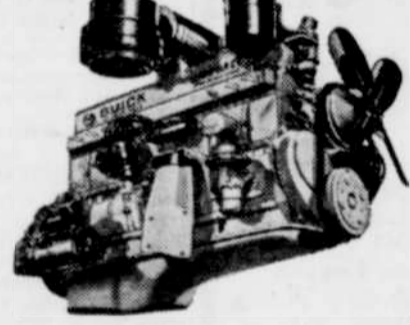
Entertainment Given—
