ing to school by bus. We have a fine situation here, with the country and town youngsters mingling together. If we build somewhere other than on the present location, would we put all town youngsters in the building? How would the people feel? We hope to keep the two sections amalgamated to the benefit of both the rural people and town people."
Mr. Hartley briefly discussed a bill, to be voted on in November, that would increase the state's share of the cost of operating schools. The increase would be from \$50 to \$80 for each census child. The bill would help Nyssa particularly because this community has grown rapidly.
"The board feels we have bonded the district enough", Mr. Hartley said. "It feels that anything else done should be done on a cash basis, so far as possible. We could add four rooms to the elementary building for probably \$40,000 or \$35,000. That would be the ultimate for that building. We could add the same number of rooms to this building at about the same cost. We should do it when times are good. In the last seven years we have spent \$200,000 in cash on buildings, mostly on the new addition."
Mrs. W. W. Foster, a member of the board of managers of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers, which meets four times a year, reported on the last meeting of the group and discussed the national P. T. A. building to be erected in Chicago.

Mrs. Foster told of the pleasure of the German student, Arno Preller, over his trip to Nyssa to talk to the P. T. A. in November. He reported that through the trip he learned much about the United States and the state of Oregon.
Mrs. Foster also discussed the national P. T. A. convention to be held in California in May.
