miles of state highway in Oregon are located in district No. 5. Of the 2200 miles, 392 are located in Malheur county. Only two counties in the state have more state highways than Malheur county, which is 13th in assessed valuation in Oregon. In 1948 Malheur county received 19 per cent of the state highway funds, amounting to \$91,000. The city of Nyssa received \$5,200 in 1949.

The state contemplates having \$40,715,000 to spend on highways in 1950, but it will not be able to keep it all. Some of it will go to

cities, counties and state police. The total net will be \$35,627,000.

"In the growth and our desire to grow, we will find certain restrictions that we have not had in these wide open spaces. The tourist trade benefits us, but the roads leading into the cities are the most vital," said Mr. Baldock. "In your quest for tourists, do not overlook the trade area."

Speaking of the proper use of the highways, Mr. Reynolds said "The roads don't belong to the state highway engineers. The roads belong to you people and you should remember that the man who overloads his trucks damages your roads. Such damage will retard your entire road program. Transportation can be very costly if you do not have good roads."

"I think the county court and county commissioners have done an excellent job in Malheur county. We approve their appointment of a county engineer."

Mr. Reynolds, Mr. Baldock and Ed Chidsey of La Grande, division engineer, were introduced by the chamber president, James W. Leslie.
