The lumbermen's legendary Paul Bunyan came back to life last week when Congressman Lowell Stockman of Oregon spoke to a convention of 4000 northeastern retail lumbermen in New York.

Representative Stockman's six feet, six inches, dressed in the loud checkered shirt and heavy boots of the lumberjack, gave to his tall tales on government the characteristic Bunyan flavor.

In the vernacular of Paul Bunyan himself, who claims he made all things, even government, the congressman said, "When it came to government-making, I used sourdough as a starter, and that was the first mistake, because then I could not stop it from growing and growing, and rising and rising, until it got to be bigger than I was in no time at all. That's what I returned for today—to tell you, and warn you about it."

"When I first contrived sourdough government, it served me for a long spell better than any other invention of mine. It took so many worries off my mind that I just went on and on leaving more and more things to the government, never dreaming I was stacking up trouble for myself."

Morse Believes Report Is Good

will only restrict our economy further. We need new wealth on which to levy a fair tax, not more taxes on our present wealth. The five-year carry-forward on losses would provide the greatest shot in the arm for business that I can imagine. The tax on small business, \$25,000 to \$50,000 a year, is outrageous."

The senator vigorously struck out at the theory that the 5½ billion deficit "will not hurt you; we can stand it." He recommended that the American government practice Yankee thrift, instead of spending 13 cents out of every dollar for debt service.

"As a member of the armed services committee of the senate, I will vote for every dollar we need to meet Russia on sudden notice," the senator said, but he added that three billion dollars could be saved annually in the armed services expenditures and still leave the country with an adequate defense. The senator pointed to other ways in which "you can save that five billion dollars easily."

Advocating revision in the Taft-Hartley labor law, Senator Morse said the law "seeks to do something after the fact, as we lawyers sometimes say. We need legislation that will do something before the fact." Senator Morse presented a new angle to the labor situation in the coal industry. He stated that "again we are treating a symptom. We should be doing something about giving stability to coal production. We can produce in a few months all the coal we need in an entire year. Coal miners' wages ought to be high, because of the danger of the work. The trouble is not basically a wage problem. We need young men in the mines, but they are not there because of the lack of stability. To stabilize the industry, we must have a decent annual wage. As long as we have instability, the men will be easy prey to the John L. Lewises."

The senator closed his address with the assertion that American reversion to political isolationism will mean war—not peace. "Partisanship," he added, must end at the water's edge. The communists want the American people to split on the foreign policy."

Don Lynch, president of the Kiwanis club, which was host at the luncheon, welcomed the guests and then presented Earl Bopp, president of the chamber of commerce, who acted as master of ceremonies.

Tony Yturri, of Ontario, who was a student in the law school at the University of Oregon when Senator Morse was dean of the school, introduced the senator in glowing terms. Mr. Yturri paid tribute to the senator for his fighting spirit "that he said had been exhibited during the senator's entire public career."

Tigers Tighten Grip On Pennant

The Ontario Tigers strengthened their hold on first place by winning a pair of games during the past week in Snake River Valley league competition.

On Tuesday the Tigers dumped the Parma Panthers 46 to 30 and on Friday won a close decision over the Fruitland Grizzlies 31 to 29. The double win by the Tigers and Vale's 43 to 21 defeat by the Weiser Wolverines gave the Tigers a two-game edge in the hot title race.

The ball game of the week was the Ontario-Fruitland tilt at Fruitland Friday night. The fired-up Grizzlies led 8-7 at the first quarter, 17-14 at the half and 23-22 at the third quarter. Not more than 4 points ever separated the two teams. They battled down to the wire with Ontario trailing until the final minute when Mickey Jackson canned one to tie the ball game. With less than 30 seconds to go the same Jackson punched one through to give Ontario the ball game. Moore and Puckett hit 19 each for the Grizzlies while Carl Willis led the Tiger scoring with 11 points. The Grizzlies scored two more field goals than the Tigers, but hit only 1 out of 9 charity tosses.

The second place Vale Vikings split their games last week. On Tuesday the Vikings dropped the Nyssa Bulldogs 51-46 in a game that saw the Bulldogs catch fire in the final quarter to pour 19 counters through the hoop and close a 16-point deficit to a 5-point difference. Their efforts fell short and the Vikings won. Dickey was high man for Vale with 12 while Pecka and Holcomb shared scoring honors for the Bulldogs with 14 each. On Friday the Vikings were edged 43-41 by the Weiser Wolverines. The Wolverines saw a 9-point third-quarter lead melt as the Vikings rallied in the final minutes. However, the Weiser quintet staved off the rally to win the close decision. Walker tallied 14 points to lead the Wolverines while Still, Viking center, collected the same number to lead the Vale scoring.

The Emmett Huskies won a pair of ball games the past week to stay

in firm possession of third place in the league. The Huskies had to overcome a first half deficit to dump Payette 43-34 Tuesday at Emmett and they used every man on the varsity squad Friday night in swamping New Plymouth 51-26.

Ronnie Chadwick landed in 16 points; most of them in the final half, to lead the Huskies to victory. Crosby, Pirate center, led the Pirates with 13. In the New Plymouth game Coach Dalberg used a complete new line-up and gave all varsity players a chance to play against the Pilgrims. Stipp was high for the Huskies with 9, while Laurie led the Pilgrims with 9.

The Weiser Wolverines split a pair of games this week. On Tuesday the Wolverines lost to the close checking Grizzlies crew from Fruitland 33-22, and on Friday tipped the 2nd place Vale Vikings 43-41 in a crowd pleaser.

In the Fruitland game Lowe, Weiser forward, led the Wolverines in scoring. Moore, league-leading Grizzly guard, dumped in 15 for Fruitland.

The Payette Pirates after losing to Emmett 43-34 bounced back to thump the Parma Panthers 36-20. The win moved the Pirates to an even 500 in league standings. The Pirates led at all stages of the game. Hollis Crosby tallied 13 points for

Payette while Parrill, Panther guard, tallied 13 for Parma. Adrian dropped a pair of south-western Idaho B League games to Marsing, 34-22, and to Middleton, 60-27.
