"We shall not soon forget the pleasant visit we had at Nyssa." About the time Governor McKay was writing the letter, the chamber of commerce was sending to him a quantity of food products representative of this community. 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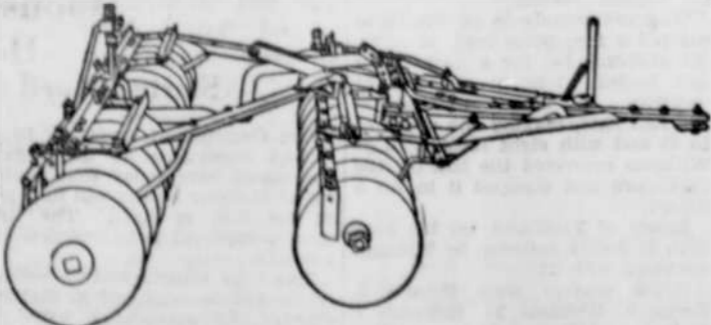
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
