Patch Written Up In Article

An article about Dennis Patch, principal of the Nyssa high school, appeared in the January issue of Education News, the Oregon state department of education bulletin. The write-up appears under the caption "Meet Oregon Educators", a regular feature of the bulletin.

The article reads as follows: "School people in Malheur County work with and know one of Oregon's most capable high school principals, Dennis W. Patch of Nyssa. 'Denny' is a native of Malheur County, having been born on the Oregon side across from Weiser, Idaho, in the first decade of this century."

He attended a one-teacher school eight grades. For high school, he went to Weiser, where he was graduated in 1926. Between working in logging camps and attending Oregon State College, he was graduated from the school of forestry in 1932. A teaching job at Halfway that fall started him on his way.

Denny taught Latin, English, and history that first year and also coached girls' basketball. He admits that he liked all his experiences that year except the latter. In strictest confidence he will admit "Today I'd rather see a cat fight than a girls' basketball game."

Halfway not only entered into his selection of occupation, but it was there that he met Miss Dorothy Taylor, a member of the staff who is now Mrs. Patch. She is a Willamette University graduate. The Patch's have two sons: Donald, 14; and David, 11.

After two years as a teacher, he was elected principal of Halfway High School, where he served for four years. Then came a year's work with the C. C. C., followed by the principalship at Adrian. Burns was the next stop for two years, and in 1947 he was elected to his present position.

Mr. Patch has been active in local civic and educational work. For recreation, he occasionally finds time for some stream fishing. He also keeps the athletic statistics and records for the Snake River Valley Conference.
