Legion Advocates Religious Program

The American Legion in Oregon has designated March and April as "Teach Children Religion" months and is sponsoring an active program in each of the American Legion posts in the state.

Robert Talbot, Jr., commander of Nyssa post of The American Legion, announced the program, emphasizing that "it is a program without any partisan or denominational connections, and can be supported with equal enthusiasm by Protestants, Catholics and Jews."

The picture appearing in this newspaper is a reproduction of a 14 x 22 inch multi-colored card which Legionnaires will place on prominent display throughout Oregon in places of business in schools and places of worship.

Commander Talbot described the purpose of this program as being to awaken all citizens, regardless of their station in life, and without relation to their religious affiliations, to the need for "moral and spiritual consciousness on the part of our children, who are the citizens of tomorrow, and who will either fill important positions of leadership in the church, home, business and government or else fall by the wayside, based upon the opportunities we afford them to understand their spiritual and moral responsibilities."

Malheur-Free Of Cow Tuberculosis

M. E. Knickerbocker, chief of the division of animal industry of the state department of agriculture, reported today that Malheur county has been re-accredited as a bovine tuberculosis-free county. This brings to 30 the number of Oregon counties now on the modified accredited-free rating with respect to tuberculosis in cattle.

Malheur county receives this rating as result of the record made last year in tests of all dairy and purebred breeding animals, plus at least 10 percent of the range beef breeding cattle. The tests were made by federal veterinarians working under the cooperative federal and state project.

The rating is based on tests of 5,013 animals, only three or .006 percent of which were reactors. This is an extremely low percentage of reactors, even in light of the one-half of 1 percent reactors which are permitted to counties to attain the accreditation rating.

3 Malheur Cows Make Honor Roll

Three Malheur Jersey cows are listed on the Oregon honor roll for December with completed lactation records, according to information issued in the county by Lawrence Jackson, supervisor of the Malheur County Dairy Herd Improvement association.

Two aged cows in the A. L. Thompson and Son herd, Nyssa, produced 569.2 pounds of fat and 564.8 pounds of fat each while a two-year-old cow in the Charley Grider herd, also of Nyssa produced 417.6 pounds of fat. These records are based on standard 305 days or less for the lactation period.

The January report for the dairy herd improvement association has just been issued by Mr. Jackson. Herds on both standard and owner-sampler plans are included in the report.

The 21 herds on standard test with 429 cows averaged 663 pounds of milk with 31.1 pounds of butterfat. The 12 herds in the owner-sampler group had 137 cows producing 667 pounds of milk with 31.2 pounds of butterfat. The figures compare with the December report on 19 standard herds with 396 cows averaging 657 pounds of milk with 31.5 pounds of fat.

The state average for standard herds for December on 581 herds averaging nearly 30 head was 547 pounds of milk with 27.2 pounds of butterfat. It is noticeable that from two to five per cent of the cows in herds on test are culled out every month for low production, disease and other causes. Low producers number as many of the culls as all

other reasons combined. Herd testing provides a means for the dairyman to do systematic culling of his herd and enables him to adjust his management practices accordingly, Jackson said.

The Holstein herd owned by W. W. and Edward Ker, Route 2, Payette, led the Malheur association with 944 pounds of milk and 40.4 pounds of butterfat average for 41 head in the herd.

The two high cows in the association are in the Ker herd, with 913 pounds of fat and 76.5 pounds of fat respectively. D. L. Hurst, Nyssa, owned the third high cow, a Jersey, with 69.5 pounds of butterfat for January.

The high 10 herds in Malheur county produced an average of 719.5 pounds of milk with 34.6 pounds of fat.

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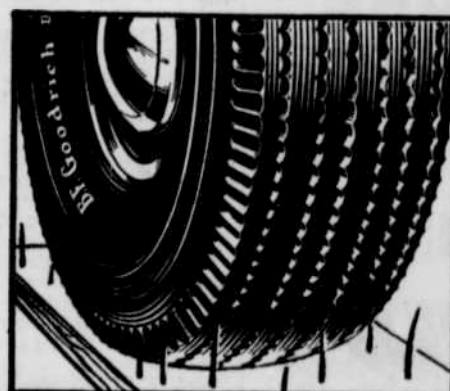


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
