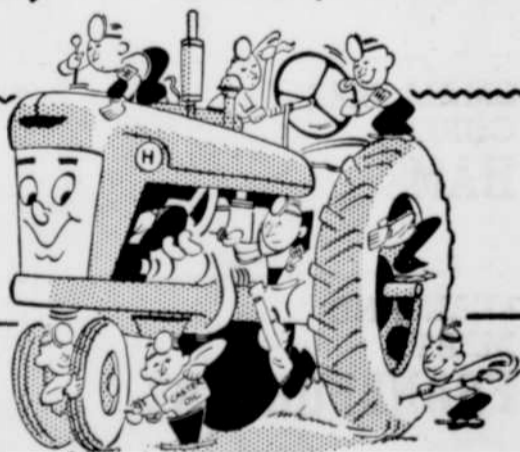

Visitors Learn Life Of Mexican People Pleasant

Mr. and Mrs. John Reffett of Nyssa and Mr. and Mrs. Loren Hite and two small sons of Haines, Oregon returned Wednesday evening from a month's vacation trip to Old Mexico. They covered 5000 miles on the trip.

They first entered Mexico from Yuma, Arizona, going to Cholla bay, where they camped in tents at Rocky Point. Fishing was fine there, with grups weighing from 30 to 100 pounds apiece, and also plenty of sea bass and trigger fish. After plenty of fishing, the visitors backed-tracked to the states, re-entering Mexico farther east, this time at Nogales. They traveled the Vera Cruz highway, as the Pan American highway was too highly Americanized.

At Guaymas, over 300 miles south rented clean, comfortable living quarters for the six of them for \$17.5. A good full meal, including soup, meat and vegetables, could be had for 25 cents or they could cook for themselves. A Mexican 14-year-old lad was hired to sweep, do odd chores, and take the two small children out.

At Guaymas, with a pleasant temperature of 80 degrees and nights just cool enough for one blanket and good sleeping, the visitors really enjoyed themselves. Here one could hire boats with a motor at rates of from \$1 to \$4 a day, or larger six-man boats for \$8 to \$25. An abundance of fresh rock oysters and clams were found.

The travelers were so comfortably located and were on such a fine highway, they prolonged their stay, visiting nearby inland cities. They were fortunate in attending the big annual pre-Easter parade, festivities and fiesta, at the city of Hermosillo. In the long parade of floats and bands, one float was especially fine and noticeable. This float, "Hands Across the Border," featured two lovely girls, "Queen of Arizona" in front of the United States flag and "Queen of Sonora" in front of the Mexican flag, each with clasp hand, portrayed the spirit of friendliness between the two. Later festivities included the ceremonial throwing of confetti by the young people. This merry ritual seemed a part of the religious ceremony, as that of a blessing to those receiving the confetti bestowed upon them. Although the two families understood little Spanish, the people were exceptionally gracious in the friendliness.

The type of country, varied greatly. On one 100 mile stretch of desert, one saw only cactus, and occasional donkeys. Donkeys, one to four, were hitched to carts, and always were hauling wood. Then to the south Oberdon, there was the beautiful, level, fertile farming area, resembling the Illinois plains. This region was under irrigation, very productive, with bananas, cotton, rice, and grapefruit growing. Her modern equipment was in use. Far to the south of the city men were laying block after block of

new sewage and tillage for the rapidly expanding city.

The vacationers were all completely sold on the friendliness of the Mexican people, who are a naturally devout, happy people devoted to quiet family life with music and good-humor intermingled.
