Churches Will Give Programs Easter Sunday

Other Holy Week Events Scheduled For Nyssa Residents

The churches of Nyssa are observing services for Holy week, which will culminate in the special Easter services to be held Sunday morning.

On Thursday evening at 8 o'clock there will be a communion service at the Methodist church, using the theme, "The Darkening Shadows." Several of the churches will have services in observance of Good Friday. At the St. Paul's Episcopal church, the Rev. Harold Parrot of Baker will speak at 7:30 p. m.

At the Catholic church the adoration service will be held at 8 p. m. Friday, followed by confessions for adults.

The Nazarene church will join with the Nazarene church of Parma for a Good Friday service at Parma Friday noon.

The annual Good Friday services at the high school under the auspices of the Hi-Y club will be held, with Rev. Don Maxfield as speaker. The Faith Lutheran church will have communion services at 8 o'clock Friday evening.

On Saturday morning at 10 at the Catholic church there will be confessions for children and from 3 until 4 p. m., confessions for adults. Easter Sunday mass at the Catholic church will be held at 9:30 a. m.

At the Christian church on Sunday morning, Rev. Donald Maxfield will use as his sermon theme "The Final Victory." The choir will sing, "Christ the Lord is Risen," and "Song of Easter Day."

At the Lutheran church Sunday morning, Rev. Sherwin Schmit will speak on "He is Risen" and a mixed quartet, Marilyn Ekanger, Rev. Schmit, Mrs. Roy Hoff and Roy Hoff, will sing "Song of Easter Dawn."

The Sunday school hour at the Nazarene church will be used for the presentation of an Easter program by the children of the school. At the 11 o'clock hour there will be special music and an Easter sermon by the pastor, Rev. E. J. Wilson. The young people of the church will present an Easter cantata at 7 p. m.

Mrs. Wilson is a member of the Imperial Society of Teachers of Dancing; the British Ballet organization and the American Tap association. She is recognized as an honor student in these three organizations. Mrs. Wilson graduated from David's college in London, where she studied dress designing, decor and choreography.

At the age of 8, Mrs. Wilson won first place in a competitive dance review in which dancers from all of England performed.

Before coming to this country, Mrs. Wilson had her own dance school, The Betty Whineup Dancing school, with an enrollment of 250 pupils. The school was located on the outskirts of London and employed three qualified instructors. Instruction was given in ballet, acrobatics, tap and slow rhythm, national and character dances. An outstanding event of each year was the annual dancing display, which ran for a week in London. These displays were attended by members of the nobility and the lord mayor of London and large sums of money raised by these events were each year given to charity.

Mrs. Wilson met her husband when he was stationed in London as a Lieutenant-colonel. They were married two years later in New York.

The dance recital on Saturday evening will feature colorful costumes for the various dance numbers. During the program intermission, refreshments will be sold by the American Legion auxiliary.

Water Prospect For Nyssa Area Is Satisfactory

Survey Reports Given At Annual Meeting Held In Ontario

A record increase in snow in the high mountain areas of the Owyhee and Malheur watersheds during March guarantees satisfactory supplies of water for this major irrigation area this year, despite the record low storage in the Agency Valley reservoir.

Such was the conclusion reached at the 15th annual water forecast meeting held in Ontario Tuesday by W. T. Frost, in charge of snow surveys for the Oregon State experiment station and the soil conservation service. The meeting was attended by nine representatives of interested agencies.

Throughout the area the soil moisture is better than it has been for several years and is such that many farmers have been unable to begin their normal operations. Such is the report made by Harry Sandquist of the extension service, Ralph Brooke of the U. S. National bank, and H. D. Zobel of the Amalgamated Sugar company.

The big Owyhee reservoir is now holding 458,800 acre feet of water, according to Paul L. House, irrigation manager of the Owyhee project. This figure is about 100,000 acre feet more than last year at this date and with an expected inflow of 320,000 acre feet during the April-September period will be ample for irrigation purposes with average to 195 per cent of the average.

Antelope reservoir in Jordan Valley was reported by Robert W. Hamilton, manager of the Jordan Valley irrigation district, to be holding 22,192 acre feet as compared with 12,000 last year. With good snow-melt conditions this reservoir should fill this year.

Snow surveys in the Malheur watershed are generally equal to or better than last year and they run from 136 to 195 per cent of the average. The total water content of the snow on the Malheur watershed usually drops a little between March 1 and April 1 but this year there was an average increase of 4.0 inches of water over the area. Lake creek snow course, for instance, has increased in water content from 9.4 inches March 1 to 13.8 inches April 1. Usually the April survey records about 1.5 inches less water content.

This water increase means the inflow into the Warm Springs and Agency Valley reservoirs will be considerably increased over that which

C Of C Members Urged To Find Mental Health

Mrs. Moorhead States Worry Is No. 1 Health Problem

Mrs. Jannelle Moorhead, who is conducting an extension course in Ontario as a representative of the state department of higher education, told members of the Nyssa chapter of commerce Wednesday noon during discussion of "How To Make Yourself Efficient" that "worry and tension in our present day living is probably our No. 1 health problem."

Because of their close association with so many other people in the business and professional world, Mrs. Moorhead said men seem to have more worries than women. But, she added, that women share these tensions.

"Men worry about holding their job," Mrs. Moorhead said. "You worry about advancement. It is important to human beings that they are getting ahead. So we worry if we do not get ahead. On the question of civic worries, the males hold most of the governmental worries."

"The chief worries today deal with the chaotic world situation. Perhaps we cannot grasp the meaning of this atomic age; it seems almost to stupendous to understand. We can do something about it because we are going to have to influence our leaders. We are going to have to begin to think in terms of a world. We live today with slow poison of anxiety. Fears today are based generally on those things we cannot do anything about. Primitive man could do something to relieve his fears and anxiety because he was close enough to them to take quick action."

"Believe it or not, the fear of the 10-year-old is whether his father will lose his job. That is an indictment of our way of life. We came to adulthood with all of the tensions we gathered along the way. There are three methods to use in overcoming worry. First—we can attack the situation. That is the best method. If we can attack our

Mr. O'Toole, who has a wife and one child, will return to Nyssa in three weeks to assume his new duties. He has rented an apartment from Bernard Frost on north First street. Mr. O'Toole will supervise the purchase of equipment and organization of personnel of the hospital. He has equipped and organized the personnel of two other hospitals, the Biggs-Gridley hospital and the Exter hospital, both in California, and just recently re-opened the Mt. Shasta hospital.

Mr. O'Toole, who is 49 years old, was born in New York of Irish Catholic parents. Since his graduation from Islip high school in New York he has been engaged in hospital work for about 30 years. Additional Run At Sugar Plant Finished Monday

Labor Supply For Field Work Assured; Farmers Planting Beets

The Amalgamated Sugar company completed Monday of this week at the Nyssa factory a Steffen's house run for the production of additional sugar from molasses, which amounted to 35,000 bags of sugar.

An additional 100 men were employed during the 48-day campaign, which was started immediately after completion of the regular 1949-50 campaign at the Nyssa factory. The residue of the Steffen's house process consists of feed molasses for livestock.

Molasses from the Nampa, Twin Falls and Rupert plants as well as from the Nyssa factory was processed during the additional run.

Jared Lewis of Nyssa, district manager of the sugar company, said the campaign was started as an experimental venture and was very successful.

Labor recruiters of the company in California and Texas have told Mr. Lewis that they will have laborers in this district when they are needed. However, probably housing will be the limiting factor in the supply of labor. Mr. Lewis urged farmers to arrange for some type of housing for men, so that when workers are available the producers will be in a position to take advantage of the labor supply.

With farmers planting beets in all sections of the district, 50 per cent of the acreage is expected to be planted by this week-end. A few beets are already coming through the ground.

Growers Discuss Potato Problems

A program for the improvement of the quality of Malheur county potatoes was outlined in Ontario Friday night by directors of the Malheur County Potato and Onion Growers association.

Klass Tensen, association president, pointed out that the quality of potatoes when they reach terminal markets is the factor which increases or retards the demand for Malheur county spuds. He explained that the quality inspections made on Malheur county potatoes in Chicago in 1948 and 1949 were discouraging and that the situation should be improved if Malheur growers are to compete in the market with more quality-conscious states.

Sam Hartley, Nyssa grower, shipper, and member of the Oregon potato commission, explained that the basis for a quality improvement program was good seed, sufficient maturity, and careful handling during digging, processing and shipping.

Under seed improvement, the association directors recommended that only high quality seed be planted. Certification inspections can be obtained for \$2 an acre, which will tell the grower what disease he has in the field in the seed he is growing for one-year-out stock. If the potatoes pass the field inspection, a green house test can be obtained. This would have relieved a lot of farmers' minds as to the quality of their seed the past year and is the only reliable method of determining the extent of disease, according to Leeds Bailey, county extension agent.

Improvement in maturity was noted last year when growers used beaters to beat off the vines in advance of harvesting and delayed harvest later than in previous years. Directors advocated that similar practices be followed in 1950.

Handling in regard to bruising came in for its just criticism. Hartley stated that the difference in quality from bruising by different operators was sometimes enough to hire a good job done. He pointed to poorly adjusted and operated diggers and rough handling in loading and unloading as major causes of bruises. A number of the smaller bruises don't show until the shipment reaches the terminal market, where they preserve the black eye of the county in which they originated.

Bert Adams of Homedale, former Nyssa resident, was here last Saturday to investigate the rural fire protection district preliminary to the possible establishment of such a district for farmers of the Homedale area.

Ralph Lawrence, assistant fire chief at Nyssa, told a group of Homedale farmers at a meeting held Monday night about the rural district organization. The farmers will hold a conference with the city council of Homedale to discuss the proposed district.
