Water Prospect For Area Good

was expected one month ago. The Warm Springs now holds 148,150 acre feet, according to Walter White, superintendent of the Warm Springs and Vale-Oregon districts. This is less than the 64,000 stored in 1949 but greater than the record low of 1948. Brogan reservoir was reported to be holding 2,863 acre feet as compared with 6,700 last year at the same date.

All lands in the Malheur-Owyhee area that are dependent on natural flow of streams for their supplies will have good water supplies if snow-melt conditions are satisfactory. Unseasonable high temperatures or dry winds of extended duration can seriously reduce the amount of water to come from mountain snows.

Also attending the meeting were Leeds Bailey, extension service at Ontario, and Fred M. Tilston, soil conservation service, Ontario. The gathering was the fourth in a series of nine district forecast meetings scheduled for the state.
