## Ontario Company Giving Bonus For Corn Contracts

The Oregon Frozen Food company, recently organized in Ontario, will hold its annual growers meeting at the plant Wednesday, April 12 at 8 p. m., according to a letter issued by Neph Grigg, president of the concern. The public is invited to attend the meeting.

Grigg announced that the company will pay a stock bonus of \$2 a ton above the contract price of corn. The bonus will be the concern's answer to abnormally slow conditions of the corn contract market. The president said his firm had contracted approximately 800 acres of corn, but needs a total of 2000 acres in order to operate next summer as planned. He explained that the price of corn has dropped during the past two years.

Grigg explained that it is difficult to arrange contracts at today's price of \$18 a ton. The dividend stock will be issued by special stock certificates after the corn is delivered, at which time the tonnage will be known. On the basis of anticipated acreages, this amount is expected to be \$20,000.

The company listed several reasons for its decision to offer the bonus. Officials feel that the company will be stronger with grower participation and that the plant can be purchased more advantageously if there is grower ownership. They hope that the bonus will stimulate corn acreage and that the plant cost will be lowered as a result of a capacity run.
