Coy plans to work only two more weeks.

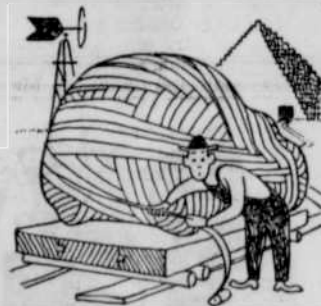
A. A. U. W. TO MEET
