The history of the county P. T. A. up to 1930 was read by Mrs. Martha Klingback of the Owyhee district. Mrs. Klingback stated that the P. T. A. work began 36 years ago, in 1914, when a congress of mothers was first organized. In 1916 the first P. T. A. circle was organized with Mrs. Irwin Troxell of Ontario as president. By the spring of 1920 there were seven associations. Mrs. Ella Smith of Nyssa was the first president of the county P. T. A. with Mrs. Charles Schweizer, also of Nyssa as secretary. Some of the objectives that have been achieved by the organization throughout the years have been the securing of a county nurse; efforts toward securing the full-time county health unit; the backing of 4-H work in the county; hot lunch programs in the schools and adult education. Some of the leaders in the Parent-Teacher association who were present for the meeting Saturday were Mrs. Ella Smith, Mrs. Charley Schweizer of Nyssa, Mrs. Irwin Troxell, Mrs. William Laxson, both of Ontario, Mrs. E. 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machines should provide for the almost unlimited number of human wants and that we can obtain real economic security only by leaving our minds open to the long term outcome of this every-continuing industrial revolution.

Mrs. McPartland offered the suggestion that "If we are to have peace we must become acquainted with people in other parts of the world. We must learn what they have contributed to world peace."

"We preach that democracy is an ideal system of government, yet we continually hear from communists that we are not the people we thought we were. We preach democracy, but do not always live up to what we preach."

All minorities in the United States have made contributions to the American way of life. Mrs. McPartland said. She mentioned the contributions of the negro in the realm of music and dancing and the Japanese in flower growing and cookery. Mrs. McPartland referred to the contributions of the Hebrews to the poetry and literature of the Bible.

The speaker said that in cases in which the negro has had equal opportunity he has shown as much cultural development as persons of any other group. She cited George Washington Carver, science; Marian Anderson, music; Richard Wright,

writing, and many others.

Pointing out that the same problems existed 30 years ago, Mrs. McPartland said "The people agree on the need for tolerance, but they do not do anything about it."

Before the panel discussion, Clyde Snider referred to the special election to be held in May to give voters an opportunity to ballot on a proposal to allow the county to exceed the six per cent limitation in its 1950-51 budget by \$87,500.

If the proposal is approved, \$39,000 of the \$87,000 item will be used to retire a present deficit. A levy of approximately 3 1/2 mills will be required to raise the \$87,000. County services that would be discontinued if the proposal is not approved would

include library service, the county agents office, including the 4-H club work, and the full-time health unit.

"If you feel these services are necessary, then I think you should take a stand on this 3 1/2 mill increase. We have no alternative in this county, if we retain these services, except to vote for this 3 1/2 mills tax."



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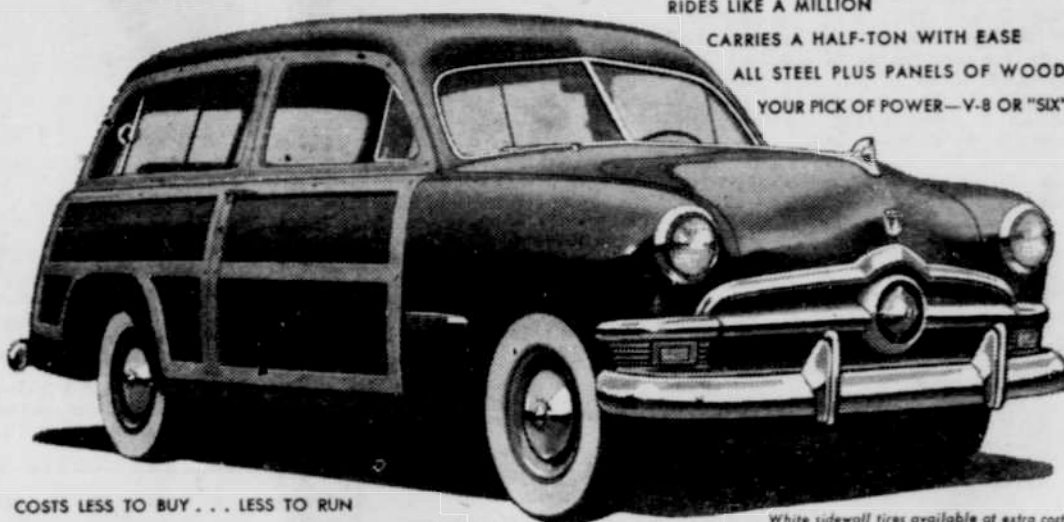
