have had the success that we have had. All of our cases have been or are being treated".

Henry Hartley, who presided at the meeting as chairman, said no attempt had been made by the speaker to cover the many other phases of the health program.

Walter McPartland, grade school principal, said of the county library service that the county library places from 39 to 35 books in each of the 28 Nyssa school rooms for the teachers to use. He said school officials could probably place the books "A good many of the books that should be read have to be 'sold' to the children", McPartland said. "Books are changed about three times a year. The librarians have the opportunity and knowledge to give the children a resume of each book. The librarians get reading done on a little higher level".

Mrs. Donald Campbell said the librarian has also been of help to church schools and Mr. Hartley said she furnishes great numbers of books to high school. To buy the books would cost the school district many thousands of dollars.

Melvin Spitz introduced Mr. Anderson of the county agent's office, who explained the co-operative nature of the rural service group as supported by the federal government, state government and county.

The extension program is designed primarily to help agriculture, but in another phase it helps adults who have not had a chance to go to college. It is devised by the people on the basis of their needs, Anderson said. The work also includes the home-making and 4-H divisions. In addition to receiving thousands of office and telephone calls, extension workers made 2116 farm visits to 1730 farms. The home demonstration agent had 500 enrolled in units. The 4-H program included 1295 member projects. The exten-

sion service engaged in seed certification, weed control, dairy herd improvement, dairy breeding programs, insecticide and weedicide programs and many others.

Mr. Hartley discussed the proposed balanced plan for legislative representation in Oregon. He gave much the same information as was presented at a meeting last Thursday night, when a committee was organized to promote the issue.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Raisin Tapioca Pudding
Broadcast: May 13, 1950

1 egg, separated 1/4 cup Fat Milk
1/2 cup brown sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla
2 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca 2 marshmallows
few grains salt 1/2 cup water 2 teaspoons jelly

Beat egg white until stiff, but not dry. Beat in 1/4 cup brown sugar. Mix in saucapan the tapioca, 1/4 cup brown sugar, the salt and water. Boil over low heat 5 min., or until tapioca is clear and thick. Stir in slowly a mixture of slightly beaten egg yolk, milk and raisins. Stir to a boil over low heat, then boil and stir 30 seconds longer. Take off heat; add vanilla. Fold in egg-white mixture. Put into 4 dessert dishes. Chill. At serving time, garnish with marshmallow halves. Top each marshmallow with equal parts of jelly.
