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Japan Makes Headlines

Japan has made headlines in American newspapers in recent days and is doubtless destined to make a good many more before our occupation forces leave, so the ex-island enemy should be receiving the close attention of our people.

First, Japanese Communists assaulted American military personnel without evident provocation and leaders were promptly arrested. Then the Japanese people held an election of members of parliament and the Liberal party, which alone stuck to the United States in a campaign marked by a good deal of nationalistic appeal, emerged as the strongest, winning a rather spectacular victory. Here, it appears, is the most convincing vindication our occupation policy has received, from the Japanese people themselves, who know if anybody does, how it has worked.

This was followed by an order from the government, prompted by MacArthur, banning from political activity for life 24 top Japanese Communist leaders. Note that the party isn't outlawed, but its present leadership is crippled. There is however nothing to prevent new

leaders rising and operating, if they can obey the laws of the country, which do not prohibit expression of opinion but do prohibit violence.

Our occupation may be expected to grow more difficult. Japanese Reds, operating on orders from Moscow, will help make it so, and the inevitable post-war ills will be laid by many at the doors of the occupation. But it is apparent that we do have a large popular support in Japan, something we doubt if any occupation army ever did before after five years—Idaho Free Press.

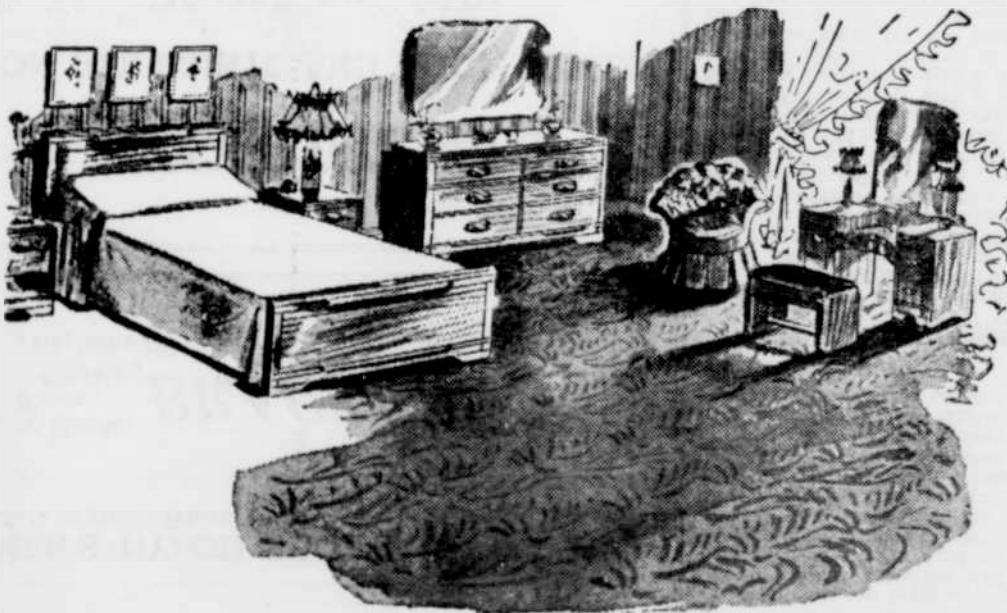
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
