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Notice of School Election Upon Question of Increasing Tax Levy Over Amount Limited by Section 11, Article 71, State Constitution

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held in School District No. 26c of Malheur County, State of Oregon, from 2:00 P. M. to 8:00 P. M., June 19 at the Elementary School in said school district, for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said district the question of increasing the tax levy for the fiscal year 1950-1951 over the amount limited by section 11, article XI, of the Constitution of Oregon.

The reasons for increasing such levy are:
Increased enrollment necessitates enlarging the staff. An item of \$32,000.00 is included to furnish and complete the new building, landscape the grounds, etc. Insurance costs are larger, a new bus is necessary and bond and interest payments are greater.

The amount of tax, in excess of the 6% limitation, proposed to be levied for said fiscal year is \$81,219.57.
