Here From Baker—Miss Elaine Shirley of Baker visited over the week-end at the R. M. Cochran home.

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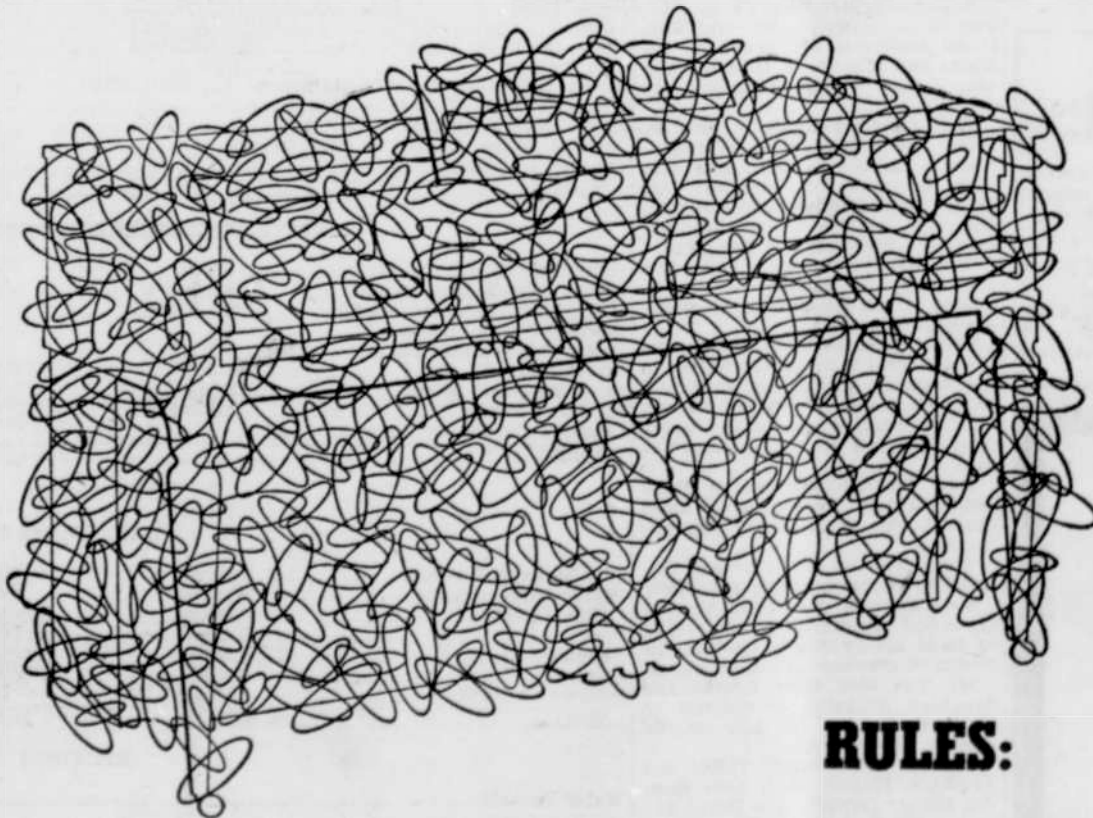
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
