City Plans To Take Action In Transient Situation

Grangers Pass On Resolutions At Convention

Nyssa Residents Among Those Thanked For Services

In the closing hours of the Oregon State Grange convention in Ontario last Friday, the Grange members rejected the Brannan plan and approved the National Grange plan for farm production control following a debate between the National Grange master, Albert S. Goss, and E. H. Spoor, California farmer and chairman of the California state PMA.

Spoor, appearing as a representative of Secretary of Agriculture Charles Brannan, spoke in favor of the secretary's proposal and Goss spoke against it.

Running its sessions past the midnight hour, the Grange considered approximately 100 resolutions bearing on subjects of interest to the nation.

The Grange failed to approve a resolution for either of the two proposed measures for re-apportionment of representation in the state legislature, although they were thoroughly discussed at the meeting.

The members adopted resolutions as follows:

The members adopted a resolution changing control of state welfare rates and expenditures from the state welfare commission to the county courts, approved a resolution favoring the establishment of a Columbia valley authority, rejected several anti-CVA resolutions, side-stepped a "socialized medicine" resolution, rejected a resolution calling for a \$100 pension to everyone 60 years of age, requested legislation plugging loopholes and exemptions in the state's corporate and income tax laws, asked that the four per cent milk be classified as standard milk and endorsed increased auto license fees and gasoline taxes for county roads, market news reports on seed crops, the soil conservation service and a higher tariff on imported nursery stock.

The Grange passed a resolution expressing gratitude and appreciation to the following persons and organizations: William G. Ross, Malheur Pomona master; Mrs. Harry Sandquist, the Ontario and Nyssa chambers of commerce, Mayor Dyer Bennett and the residents of Ontario, the Ontario public schools and administrative staff, the New Plymouth Grange, the Nyssa public schools, the newspapers and radio stations in the county, the Amalgamated Sugar company, Joe Westcott of Ontario, Jerry Clure of Burns, the Peterson Furniture company, the Odd Fellows lodge, the American Legion, the Farmers Supply co-op, the Ontario Livestock company, the Union Pacific Railroad company, the Idaho Power company, the Bonneville power administration and the advertisers who placed ads in the special convention section of the Grange Bulletin.

Irrigator Meeting Set For Wednesday

Robert Glazebrook, chief engineer of the hydraulics division of the Fairbanks-Morse company of Chicago, will talk on the use of electric pumps at an institute for irrigators to be held Wednesday, June 28, at Payette under the sponsorship of the Idaho Power company. Farmers of this area are invited to attend the institute.

"It will be an all-day affair at 9:30 a. m., with talks on irrigation and a motion picture in the morning and demonstrations of pumps and sprinklers later in the day," Bernier and Frodo, Idaho Power's district manager here, said. Idaho Power has made arrangements with the Boulevard Grange to serve a lunch to all farmers attending the institute.

Other speakers will be Arthur King, Oregon State college extension service, Corvallis, "Sprinkler Irrigation," Ralph E. Brooke, U. S. National bank, Ontario, "Financing Irrigation Systems," and Max C. Jensen, associate professor and irrigationist, University of Idaho, Moscow, "Drainage Pumping and Problems." A representative of the Idaho Power company will talk on electric rates applied to pumping.

Sprinkling pumping, relative efficiency of old and new pumps, protective devices and their applications, high head and low head pumps, head gates and other irrigation equipment will be demonstrated.

Voters Approve Special Levy In School District

300 Ballots Greatest Cast In Many Years; Margin 13 Votes

The greatest number of electors to cast ballots in a Nyssa school district election in many years, perhaps in history, approved by a very narrow margin Monday the proposal to exceed the six per cent limitation by \$81,219.57.

Last year the ballots cast in a similar election amounted to 171. On the second bond issue proposed for raising funds for the new school building last year 258 votes were cast.

The special levy carried by only 13 ballots, 155 to 142, with three ballots defective.

In the election for directors, C. W. Buchner was re-elected for a five-year term with 190 votes. Lem Wilson, Jr. received 78 write-in votes. Zobell was elected to serve one year, with 234 votes, to complete the term of R. G. Whitaker, resigned.

Before the election, the chief reasons advanced for the request to exceed the budget were the increased cost of operation as experienced by all individuals and groups, the increase in the school population, the employment of more teachers made necessary by the increased enrollment and state standards and other factors beyond the control of the school board.

Committee Named To Investigate For Councilmen

Council Votes To Hire Additional Policemen For Season

At a special meeting of the city council Wednesday night, Chairman George C. Henneman appointed a committee of two councilmen, Harry Miner and Fred W. Bracken, to meet with representatives of the Amalgamated Sugar company, the Nyssa chamber of commerce, and the Malheur County Farm Labor Sponsoring association to attempt to develop some method of controlling the irresponsible element among the transient laborers who came here ostensibly to work in the row crop fields.

The councilmen approved the appointment of the committee and adopted a motion providing for the employment of as many additional policemen as may be needed during the time the transients are living in this community.

Chairman Henneman told the representatives of the Nyssa chamber of commerce, the Nyssa Civic club and others that the "council is open for suggestions" on the transient problem.

Judge Don M. Graham, justice of the peace, said the transient situation this year is different from last year and the year before because of the importation of a low type of human beings by labor contractors. He said the labor contractors at the Adrian camp had permission to bring in 60 men and he brought in 110. Some of the men, Judge Graham said, are of the lowest possible type, winos, hopheads and others.

"That is what we are faced with this year," the judge said. "We have in our midst some of the toughest possible characters, some of whom have served terms in the penitentiary."

"The average worker who comes here on his own initiative is a pretty good citizen. The present situation is a hard thing to control because we are working with the lowest type of humanity possible to gather together in a small town like this."

"Three policemen during this season is wholly inadequate. We should have a policeman on Main street at all times. Our policemen need help. The situation could be handled by more measures. We should have a special policeman on the north side of Main street between First and Second streets to keep people moving."

Speakers at the meeting said Walter White, labor contractor, has a contract with the labor sponsoring association to bring workers to this area. The amount of his remuneration and by whom it is paid were not made clear at the meeting.
