two families picnicked Saturday at the Owyhee dam. Mr. and Mrs. Wardle returned to Utah that evening.

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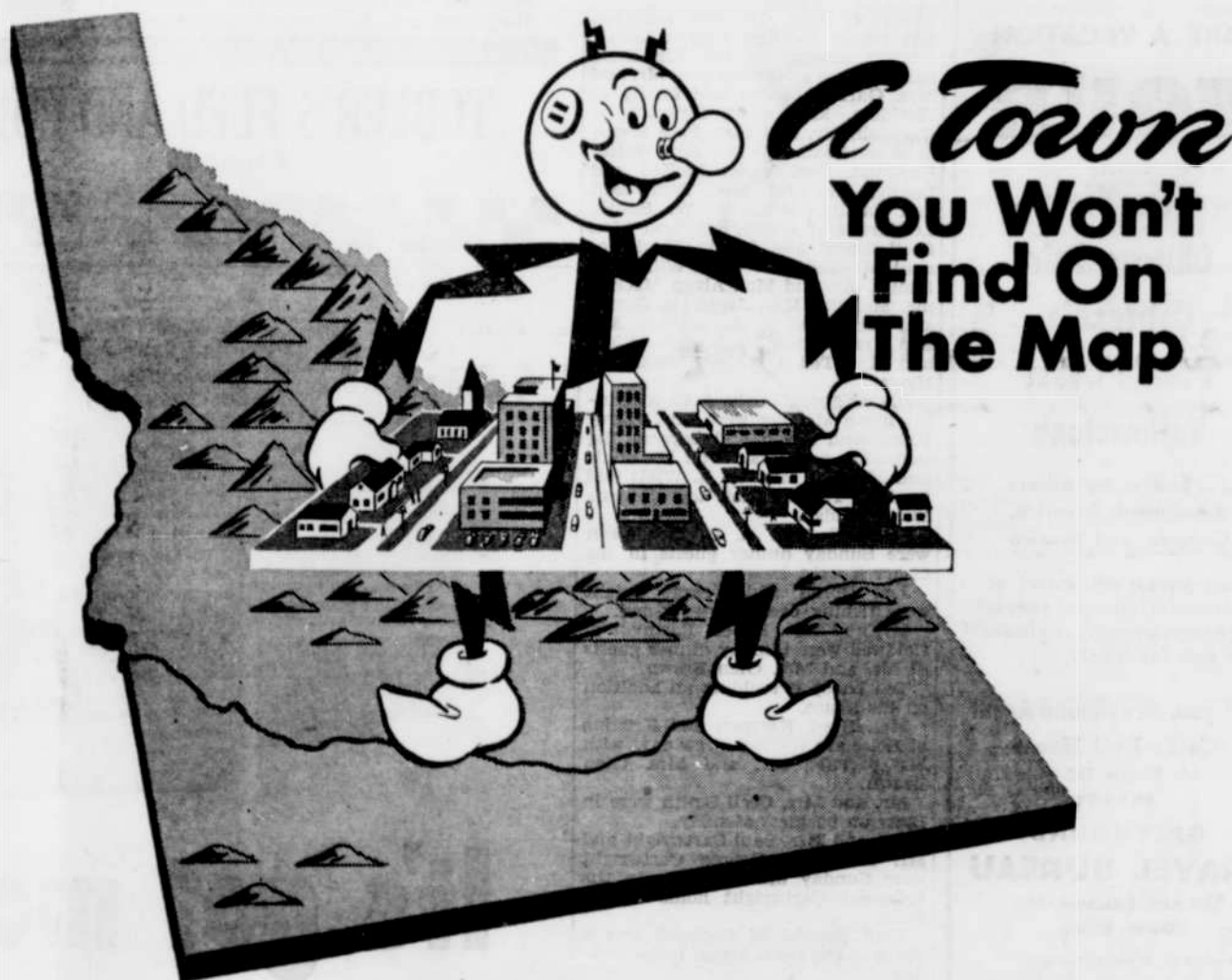
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
