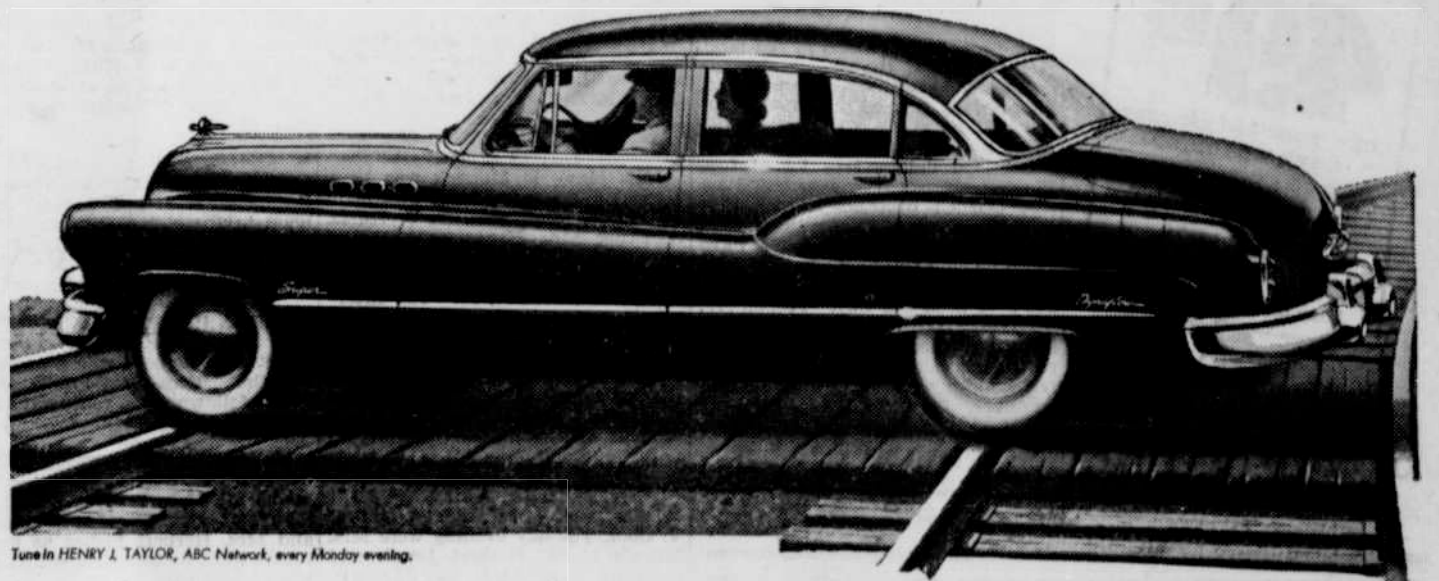

Gordon's Drive-In RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Tuna Macaroni Loaf
Broadcast: June 24, 1950

3/4 cup Sego Milk
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup diced American cheese
1 1/2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 cup soft bread crumbs
3 tablespoons finely cut onion
3 tablespoons finely cut pimiento
2/3 cup chunk-style tuna
3/4 teaspoon salt
few grains pepper
2 slightly beaten eggs
2 cups cooked, drained macaroni
Turn on oven; set at moderately slow (350° F.). Grease a 1 1/2-qt. loaf pan. Heat to boiling a mixture of milk, water, cheese and butter. When cheese melts, remove from heat. Mix in bread crumbs, onion, pimiento, tuna, salt and pepper. Fold in eggs and macaroni. Put into greased pan. Bake 1 hour, or until firm. Turn out and slice. Makes 4 servings.
