(Continued from Page 1) raised here. In fact revenue from livestock and livestock products in Malheur county exceeds that of any other county in the state. We are proud of that record.

School Superintendent Henry Hartley told the visitors "We feel we have on the average the best physical plant for school purposes in the state of Oregon. All of the school buildings are relatively new and we have renovated the old building. You in Baker are in the process of consolidating districts, but we did our consolidating a few

years ago and we can't consolidate any more. However, we have been using two rural school buildings. We are reversing the usual procedure by transporting town children to the country. The good roads, created by the Nyssa road district is saving the taxpayers money. The sugar factory is a nice thing to have in a community. The company is paying about one-fourth of our school district taxes."

A. S. Boyd of Baker thanked the sugar company for its splendid cooperation in "starting sugar beets in Baker county and for its hospitality today."

Ed Mason, secretary of the Baker County chamber of commerce, thanked the sugar company and local individuals and extended greetings from the Baker chamber.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Deviled Onions

1 lb. small onions
1½ cups boiling water
¼ teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon shortening
4 teaspoons flour
few grains pepper
½ cup Segs Milk
2 1-4-oz. can deviled ham

Peel onions; cook covered in boiling water and salt 20 min., or until tender. Drain; save ½ cup liquid. Melt shortening in saucepan; blend in flour and pepper. Stir in liquid. Boil and stir 2 min. Add onions, milk and deviled ham. Heat until steaming hot, but do not boil. Makes 4 servings.
