Gene Autry Will Appear At Rodeo

NAMPA, July 6—Special—The biggest and fastest show in the 35-year history of Nampa's Snake River stampee is promised by directors of the local Harvest Festival association when the 1950 rodeo gets underway Tuesday, July 11 for a five-night run in the newly constructed 10,000-seat stadium. Gene Autry will appear in person each night of the show, accompanied by his two famed horses, Champion and Little Champion, and by the Cass County boys, a trio of western music makers. Leo J. Cremer of Big Timber, Montana will again act as stock contractor and arena director for the show. Cremer has been staging the Nampa show since 1937 and this year will observe his 25th year in rodeo.
