second shall be: Shall the county court levy a tax for the same fiscal year sufficient to produce the sum of \$20,000 in excess of the six per cent limitation for courthouse sinking fund purposes?

The \$67,500 includes money for the county agent's office, the county health unit and the county library, as well as several smaller items.

Men attending the Vale meeting said the group will answer questions that might be asked in order to try to clarify the issue. The net additional millage, if the special levy is passed, will be approximately three mills, or \$3 for each thousand dollars of assessed valuation.

The men also found that there are six companies in the county, including the Idaho Power company, the Amalgamated Sugar company and the Union Pacific Railroad company, that pay well over half of all the taxes paid in the county. This leaves considerably less than half for the other taxpayers to pay.

The chamber also passed a resolution recommending that a beer license be granted to Earl Marshall, who intends to open a night club in a new building that he is erecting on highway 20 north of the Polar Cold Storage company plant.

One member stated that the chamber should not enter into such an issue, but others contended that the city needed a banquet room such as would be provided in the new building.

Speakers said the structure is a good building that offers great possibilities. It will seat 200 to 250 persons at dinner on the second floor and provide a special entrance to the banquet room, so that families would not have to go through the bar room and dance hall.

First National's Loans Increasing

As of June 30, deposits of \$2,881,203 and loans of \$2,214,773 were reported for the Nyssa branch of The First National Bank of Portland by G. J. Mitchell, local manager.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Spaghetti with Meat Balls

1 lb. ground beef
1/2 cup rolled oats
1/2 cup Sego Milk
1/2 cup finely cut onion
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
2 tablespoons flour
1 teaspoon paprika

2 tablespoons hot shortening
1 can condensed tomato soup
1 1/2 cups water
4 1/2 cups hot, cooked spaghetti
1/2 cup dry, grated cheese

Mix thoroughly meat, oats, milk, 1/2 cup onion, 1 teasp. salt and 1/2 teasp. pepper. Shape in 16 balls. Roll in mixture of flour and paprika. Brown in hot shortening. Drain off fat; pour over meat balls a mixture of soup, water, 1/2 teasp. salt, 1/2 teasp. pepper and remaining 1/2 cup onion. Cover; cook over low heat 25 min., or until sauce thickens slightly. Serve meat balls and sauce over spaghetti. Sprinkle top with cheese. Makes 4 servings.
