in accordance with the laws of the State of Oregon, which is more particularly described as follows, to-wit: All that portion of Eighth Street lying between the North line of Ehrgood Avenue and the westerly line of State Highway No. 20; and reserving at all times easements and right-of-way over, across and under said property and the whole thereof for the purpose of installation, repair and operating City Sewers and any and all other City facilities and public utilities.
