valley were Keiji Okano, Mr. and Mrs. Clayton Barnes, Mr. and Mrs. (Continued on Page 3)

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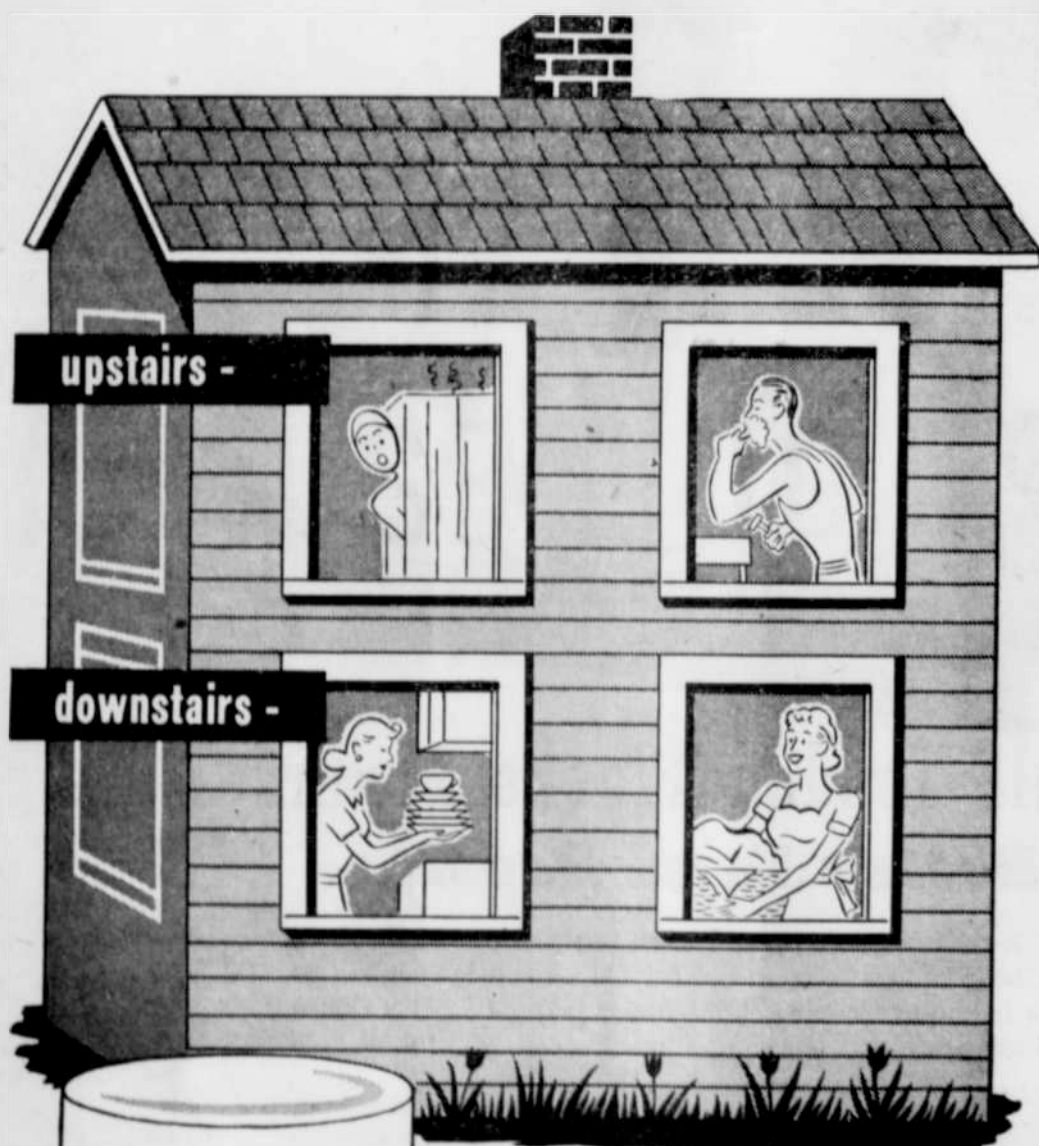
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
